from the Soviet Union. He showed many excellent photographs of birds and animals that I had never seen before.

But when he projected the picture of the osprey it reminded me of those I had seen recently at Crooked Lake. Although his photo was taken half-way around the world, I felt it could have been taken in northern Michigan.

NOT ONLY did Dr. Knystautas talk about the different types of wildlife present, but he also talked about conservation efforts to preserve them.

Russia has pollution problems, erosion problems and a reduction in

wildlife habitat, just as the United States does.

And like the United States, the Soviet Union has captive breeding campaigns under way to help establish native populations of endangered species, like the great bustard, so that they may eventually be released into the wild.

They have reserves and national parks where research and recreation of wildlife and natural areas can be appreciated.

Dr. Knystautas also expressed a deep love for the natural areas he showed us. I could tell, in the words he used to describe his subjects, that his involvement was far more than scientific. He beamed with pleasure when describing the beauty of a colorfully marked desert lizard, or the striking contrasts of a redstart.

HIS PROGRAM enlightened us to the variety of habitats that are found in the Soviet Union, whose people also have a keen interest in natural history.

One comment he made, which I remember clearly, was that even

when diplomatic relations between Russia and the U.S. were cut off because of the invasion of Afghanistan, U.S. and Russian ornithologists continued to communicate and work together to help an endangered species of crane.

Recent efforts by the Russians and Americans to save two gray whales illustrate a common goal — to preserve and to aid wildlife. They also illustrate a change in traditional Russian attitudes that Dr. Knystautas referred to several times during his talk.

A bird, butterfly, whale or any wild creature — other than man — has no political or religious convictions to alienate it. They are marvels of adaptation, creatures of beauty and forthright in their goals. Features and characteristics anyone can appreciate.

It makes me wonder: If music is said to be the international language, could nature serve as an international bond?
