

Raiders finish 5-0 in Lakes

Laurie Oswald and Kerry Doran won two events apiece to propel North Farmington to the Western Lakes Activities Association's Lakes Division dual-meet swim title with a 99-73 triumph over Farmington Thursday.

The Raiders finished their dual meet season at 9-1 overall and a perfect 5-0 in the Lakes. But the real challenge is yet to come — the WLAAs championship meet, which starts Wednesday at Plymouth State, North will attempt to defend the title it won a year ago.

"It's going to be very competitive," predicted Raider coach Pat Dubiele. "We'll be there, doing our best — as will many people. We have a pretty nice team. They've worked hard and come on very well."

Against Farmington, North captured seven of 11 firsts. Oswald won the 100-yard (2:00.60) and 500-yard (5:29.47) freestyle; Doran was a winner in the 200 individual medley (2:17.28) and 100 free (58.57).

Other Raider firsts went to Chris Duthie in the 50 free (26.07), Cady

Cenko in the 100 breaststroke (1:36.54); and Josie Komer, Jenny Wagoner, Oswald and Doran in the 400 free relay (5:53.95).

Farmington's Tonya Slicker won the diving (205.55 points). Lauren Weary was first in the 100 butterfly (1:01.13) and Katie Hohl captured the 100 backstroke (1:09.61). Weary and Jill Hawkins were also part of the Falcons' winning 200 medley relay (2:01.75).

"(Coach) Ross Bandy and Farmington's swimmers and divers did real well," said Duthie. "I was concerned about them going in. I thought they were good, and they are."

The WLAAs meet begins with swimming preliminaries at 2 p.m. Wednesday. Diving prelims will start at 3:30 p.m. Thursday. The finals for both will get under way at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

Ben Goba, sophomore, Farmington: The 10th grader is only going to improve as his career runs along.

This season, Goba finished 13th at Schoolcraft (18:43), fourth in the WLAAs (18:58), sixth in the regional and 12th in the Class A individual race.

He is the future for the Falcons, a perennial area power.

Dave Galvin, junior, Redford CC: Galvin overcame some early-season injuries to become one of the Shamrocks' most dependable runners.

His best finish occurred in the regional at Grosse Pointe where he took 10th with a time of 18:48.

He was 32nd in the Class A team race, 16th in the Catholic League and 15th at the Shrine-Shamrock Invitational.

"Once he regained some strength, he gave us good performances when we needed them the most in the last three big races," said the CC coach.

Jeff Barringer, senior, Farm. Harrison: The 12th grader was Mr. Consistency in 1988.

He finished 30th overall in the Class B Individual race, fifth in the WLAAs, fourth in the regional and eighth at Schoolcraft.

Barringer also set a school and Oakland Community College course record with a time of 16:53.

"He gave us 110 percent at all times," said Harrison coach Jeff Reed. "More importantly, Jeff is a tremendously well-rounded person who is capable of succeeding with whatever he puts his mind to."

Chris Antczak, junior, Redford CC: The good news for Shamrock fans is that Antczak returns.

He was 35th in the Class A team race, seventh in the regional (16:41), 14th at the Catholic League meet and seventh at Holly.

"We knew early in the season that he wasn't the No. 1 runner on the team, but he consistently maintained his third-place position," Magni said. "He was very effective at bridging the gaps."

James Handel, senior, Redford Borgess: A virtual unknown a year ago, Handel made great strides for the Spartans this season.

He finished 23rd in the Class B individual at finals, eighth in the regional, 10th in the Catholic League and sixth at Schoolcraft.

His best time of the season was 18:27. Handel also is an outstanding student, sporting a 3.9 GPA.

"They're just a better ballclub," Riverview coach Don Lessner said. "They left no doubt about that."

"I don't think we changed anything from what we did in the past," he said of his team's blinding defense.

"(Coleman) is clever. He's a phenomenal athlete. He gets in the open, and you can't stop him."
