Dear Mrs. C: Lighting is a fantastic display of nature's power, but it's also a deadly liller. Places where people are killed most often by lighting are in open fields, followed by under trees, on or near water, near tractors and heavy equipment, on golf courses and on telephones.

tions that can be neighbor to people of all ages. While golfing, or any other time that you are caught outside and can not reach shelter, follow these rules:

Never stand under a tall, isolated tree in an open area. It will act as a natural lightning rod.

Avoid being the tallest object on the landscape. This could happen if you are on half course, in an open

field, on a beach, in a boat, or standing on a hilltop.

Get out of and away from open water.

Keep away from tractors and

Keep away from tractors and other metal equipment.
Stay away from golf carts, motorcycles, scooters and bleycles. Put down your golf clubs.
Avoid metallic pathways (wire fences, clothesilnes, pipes and metal rails) as they are able to carry clee-

tricity to you from some distance

away.

• In wooded area, find shelter in
a low area under a thick growth of
mall trees. In the open, go to a low
place such as a ravine or valley.

If you are bopelessly bolated and
feel your hair stand on end, it means
that lightning could strike any second. Drop to your knees, bend forward and place both hands just
above your knees. Do not lie flat on

As a general rule, when a thunderstorm threatens, one should take the lie in a bone or a large bruilding. Isolated structures in an open area should be avoided. Do not use the telephones or take a bath or shower. Cars (not convertibles) generally are considered sale. (AP) — A major overhaul of Michigan's unemployment insurance system could save tarpayers up to \$12 million a year while benefiting both employers and laid-off workers, state officials say.

The 15-point plan announced re-cently capped a study of the jobless benefits program launched last spring by Gov. James Blanchard. Parts of it now face House approval,

Labor Director Elizabeth Howe said consolidating anti-fraud opera-tions would help the state recover an estimated \$4 million a year in losses from fraud generated by individuals and businesses. and businesses.
Streamlining other parts of the system could save another \$8 million

a year while sparing jobless workers time and aggravation, Howe said. "We can't afford not to do this." Howe said at the Livonia branch of the Michigan Employment Security Commission, where dozens of jobless people waited in line to receive their checks.

"We're going to change the statute so collusion between employers and employees is eliminated. We want to put some real teeth into the law," she said.



Howe said the plan would help prevent scandals like the one involving Kinross Corp., an Upper Peninsula defense contractor under investigation for allegedly paying some employees reduced wages while allowing them to receive jobless benefits.

The plan will be financed with money returned to the state from federal business taxes, she said.
