But many students probably don't realize one of the country's bigest employers, the federal government, is affiong those employers who take part in "co-op" programs.

Péderal co-op jobs are available to figh school students at least 16 years, old and to college students, both undergraduate and graduate.

Approving to Maryann Reid, a personall, staffing specialist with the U.S. government, college students can gain experience in a variety of fields, from engineering and as counting to contracting and supplies. tields, from engineering and ac-counting to contracting and supplies. REID, A GUEST on the weekly cable television program "The Job Show" at 6:30 p.m. Tsursday, Dec. 8, on Metrovision Channel 12 and students work full or part-time, depending on how their school has structured the cooperative experience. They are assigned a Government Service (GS) rating and earn the

same hourly wage as other employees at that level.

One of the most attractive features of the program, says Reid, may be the fact that a co-op jdo can often be the first step to a government career after graduation.

"The federal cooperative program is designed to lead to permanent employment," she said, in fact, cooperative jobs are usually only created when there will be a permanent need for that position.

Reid advised students to contact their school cooperative training or placement office for more informa-tion about their school's participa-tion in the federal government cooperative education program.
