Schools act to manage asbestos

Steps taken to remove PCB also

Farmington is one of the few shool districts that has filed an asbestos abatement plan and is moving ahead to clean up a potentially toxic problem, according to a recent study from Washington, D.C. The local district has also taken

The local district has also taken steps on its own to remove potential PCB contamination from school light ballasts, a project that officials expect will be completed by Janu-ary. Such PCB removal is not man-

"WE WANTED it done, and done right," said Lynn Nutter, Farming-ton schools assistant superintendent

who coordinated the effort. "We think we're on track." The Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act, or AHERA, required all public and private school dis-tricts to inspect buildings and submit to the governor, by Oct. 12, plans to manage asbestos in the buildings. Concress amended the law in

manage asbestos in the buildings. Congress amended the law in Septmeber to permit school authori-ties to seek a year's delay. Nutter estimates the district will complete most of the asbestos abate-ment during this school year, and will save \$70,000 to \$100,000 in the

will save \$70,000 to \$100,000 in the process. By getting the work done now, the district will avoid the rush that is bound to come from districts behind in complying and have to postpone their work until next summer. The Farmington school district has also addressed another potential-ity toric problem during the past few mooths — removal of PCB, or poly-chlornated biphenyl. The school board directed administrators to im-mediately get the light ballasts re-placed, some of which were leaking inguids that could have contained the potentially toric chemical.

asbestos issue has been ongoing for several years; this is the second fed-eral mandate to try and rectify the problem.

Although asbestos has not been permitted in buildings constructed since 1978, it was used in millions of structures build since the 1820s, in-cluding school buildings. In althorne form, asbestos fibers can cause lung cancer and other diseases as long as 0 years after exposure. In 1984, the Environmental Protection Agency estimated that 30,000 school build-ings, roughly a third of the nation's total, could contain breathable as-bestos.

total, could contain prestrate a bestos. The current law does not require removal of all asbestos from schools. Experts and EPA officials say the best thing to da abaut mate-rial that Is in good shape and not isdeding fibers may be simply per-iodic inspections. A badly managed removal job may pose more danger than leaving asbestos in place.
