## Women-helping-women service continues at Womencenter

The math teacher on campus said she was drawn to the Womencenter "after hearing of all the good they were doing over there" and volunteered to coordinate the peer courseling program "after learning of the very real and serious needs" of those who come to Womencenter to talk about their troubles.

"The next session for training our peer counselors starts Jan. 19 and we're taking registrations now," Graves said. "Twe taken the training myself and I can promise you it's a therapy for yourself. You've got to open up and deal with your own feelings first before you can begin to help others, and that's what the training seasons that run from 19 am. to 1 pm. Thursdays for a total of 30 hours. Each peer counseling class is limited to 12 women.

Fee for the training is \$54 and three hours per week for one semes-ter, after completing the class, serv-

ing as a counselor in Womencenter helping peers learn how to help themselves.

White describes the completion of the training "as getting a degree in your own personal growth."

GRAVES' JOB will be to see that GRAYES JOB will be to see that there are peer counselors on hand for those who choose to drop into Womencenter in J Building, schedu-ling those drop-in hours; and making sure the phones are manned for those who call for a specific appoint-

"Often women call us for an early morning, after work or evening ampointment outside of Womencenter's regular hours," Graves said. "We somehow always can get the peer counselor to meet those requests because we're all committed to what we're doing here." What the peer counselors are not doing is giving advise.
