said Negoshian.



"It was a nice win," the Farmington gymnastics coach said. "It was very good. We were real pleased with it."

What pleased Schernhorst was, first of all, the victory — 120.15-91.8 over Grosse Pointe North Monday a Farmington; second, the Falcon point total, a solid score for the first meet of the year, and third, the performance of freshman Christine Cates, who won three events outright and tled for first in the other.
