What if I'm involved in an accident? This question is asked by a lot of drivers. Many are unsure whether to call police to the scene, go to the police station, or call their insurance companies, Many insurance companies require a police report be made as part of the claim.

Police policies differ when dealing with accidents. Some departments will not respond to the scene unless there are injuries, while others like the Farmington Department of Public Safety, will respond to any type of accident.

The driver, usually a female, is driving alone and is struck in the

rear by another vehicle. She gets out of the ear to check for damage, and the "bad guys" jump out of the other car, leap into the victim's car and drive away. The victim "is lucky if she isn't robbed of her purse or assulted," Lee added.

To help avoid this type of situation, Lee gives the following tips:

• Look back at the vehicle striking you before getting out of your car. If you fear for your safety, don't get out.

• Motion to the other driver and,
ip ossible, drive to a nearby business in a well-lighted area.

• When reaching the business, get out and call police, then check damage and exchange pertinent information.

BHOLIDAY HINTS
Think about friends, family and loved ones this holiday season before direkting and driving home from a party. Commander Lee suggests if at a party where alcoholic beverages will be zerved, "have a predesignated driver to get everyone back home safely."
"Party hosts should consider that it is at least, in part, their responsibility to get their guests home safely," he added. "In the event a guest leaves a party intoxicated and gets involved in an accident, the bost may be held liable."
