Beginning in February 1989, the Oakland County Health Division will offer a series of six Expectant Parent Classes beginning at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 10, in the Southfield office of the Health Division, 27725 Greenfield Road.

Classes will be taught by public health nurses. There is no charge for attending the series of classes, but pre-registration is requested.

Topics will include maternal physical changes, good nutrition, growth and development of the fetus and the baby, labor and delivery, infant care and parenting, call 424-7042.
