St. Mary's tumbles in tourney opener

Any hopes of victory St. Mary's College of Orchard Lake entertained as it headed to the tough National Catholic Basketball Tournament were dispelled quickly in the Eagles' opening game Thursday. St. Mary's (Rensselaer, N.Y.) rolled to a 20-point halftime lead and was never threatened in its 100-71 victory.

St. Mary's got a measure of revenge Friday with a 102-82 victory over Cardinal Stritch (Milwaukee, Wis.). The Eagles led by just 47-46 at the half before pulling away with a 55-18 second-half surge. James Curtis led the offense with 25 points. James Laker had 16, Jeff Suspek 12, Jim Butcher 11 and Mike Moroney 10. Rick Rutter topped Stritch with 25.

The tournament, hosted by Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa, featured 16 of the top small college Catholic teams in the nation. St. Mary's did not play like one of its in its opener. The Eagles trailed 36-38 at the half and never got closer than 16 in the final 20 minutes.

Butcher hit three-of-four three-pointers and led St. Mary's with 13 points. Kevin Nicfield had 12 (and seven rebounds) and Jerome Washburn scored eight. The Eagles made just 32-of-86 shots (37.2 percent) to St. Joseph's 33-of-56 (58.7 percent). Free throws spelled the difference:

St. Joseph's hit 24-of-35, St. Mary's three-of-eight.

ON DEC. 28-29, the Eagles won their first tournament of the season, beating St. Francis 92-88 in the final of the Quad City International Classic, which they hosted.

The game was close throughout, with St. Francis claiming the biggest lead of the contest, 77-68, with 6:56 left.

Butcher rallied the Eagles by scoring 11 points in a 13-4 run. Butcher made three triples and the game-tying basket with 2:58 to play in the comeback. A Washburn free throw put St. Mary's on top, and eight more (in nine attempts) down the stretch clinched the win.

Terry Koerner, who injured his knee and will be lost for two weeks, led the Eagles with 18 points. Butcher had 17, Curtis 15, Washburn 11 and Denny Butcher 10. Eric Langston's 22 points paced St. Francis.

In its tournament opener, St. Mary's routed Pashaw College 89-55. Garth Howard led the Eagles with 14 points (all in the second half). Curtis had 12 and Nicfield and Washburn scored 11 apiece.

Jim Butcher and Washburn were co-MVPs for the tournament.



Bryan Wauldron headed for EMU

Wauldron will play at Eastern

Farmington Harrison's all-state wide receiver Bryan Wauldron has given a verbal commitment to play college football at Eastern Michigan University.

Harrison football coach John Herrington confirmed Wauldron's future plans for the Observer Friday night.

The 6-foot-2, 170-pound Wauldron had a record-setting senior year, helping the Hawks to an unbeaten season (15-0) and Class B state championship.

Wauldron caught 49 passes for 1,190 yards and 15 touchdowns last fall. He also had a state-final record 177 yards in Harrison's 44-9 thrashing of St. Joseph in the Pontiac Silverdome.

In his two-year varsity career, Wauldron caught 78 passes for a school record 1,902 yards and 22 TDs. He also had a team-leading 11 interceptions as a safety on defense.

Wauldron will join two former Harrison football players already on scholarship at EMU. Former teammate Chris Cox, a linebacker, completed his freshman season with the Hurons, and quarterback Vince Enright, a 1985 graduate of Harrison, has a year of eligibility remaining.

Wide receiver should be a wide-open position at EMU next season. The Hurons lose their two starters, Mark Ziegler and Craig Ostrander, to graduation.

Harrison seniors Dale Katz (linebacker), Chad Burgess (end), Jeff Skinner (linebacker) and Scott Nichols (linebacker) are still considering various schools. EMU is reportedly one of the choices on Katz' list.

Redford St. Agatha coach John Goddard confirmed Friday that all-Catholic and all-area linebacker Mike Boyle, a 6-foot-5, 230-pound tackle, also has verbally committed to EMU.
