Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week:

Woman gets probation for practicing without license

A 45-year-old woman charged with practicing medicine without a license will serve three years' probation for the offense.

The charge stems from her actions at the Oak Hill Care Center in Farmington between July and October of 1988. It falls under a violation of the state's Public Health Code.

According to Detective Dan Dellar of the Farmington Department of Public Safety, Eldridge Green of Detroit pleaded guilty to the felony before Oakland County Circuit Judge Alice Gilbert and was sentenced to probation Dec. 1.

Police arrested Green after officials at the nursing home on Grand River discovered discrepancies in the employee's paperwork.

She was using the nursing papers of a 35-year-old Northville nurse who had her purse stolen in Detroit in December 1987. She had reportedly bought the identification on the street in Detroit for \$100, police said.

As part of her job at Oak Hill, Green was dispensing medication and performing other nursing functions. Dellar said Green had no record of other such incidents.

ington Hills to 42 and six, respectively — far above the daily average of seven traffic accidents and one road runoff.

But officers investigated only one accident causing a serious injury between 7 a.m. Wednesday and 7 a.m. Thursday, said Sgt. Ray Cranstoun, Farmington Hills Police Department Traffic Section supervisor.

"There were a lot of fender-benders," he said. "Speeds were too fast for the existing road conditions. What often happens is, one car spins out and others can't stop, trying to avoid it."

The serious injury, to a Farmington Hills man, occurred at 5:20 p.m. Wednesday when his car was struck from behind by two others while stopped in traffic on Middlebelt, south of 13 Mile, Cranston said. The man was treated at William Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak.

Even patrol cars weren't immune. Two were struck, receiving minor damage, when officers were on 12 Mile-Greenacres and Orchard Lake-

travel through the city on M-102, I-275 or I-696, Cranston said.

According to a Farmington Hills police report:

The man locked the front door, hurled the counter, produced a butcher knife and gave an employee a note declaring a holdup and demanding money. Tape covered the mouth of the aid mark so he mentioned to the employee what he wanted her to do.

While the employee gathered money, the robber disabled the store's four phones. He tried to force the employee into the walk-in refrigerator but when she ran from him, he left the store.

Tracks in the half-frozen grass led police to believe the man had a car waiting near Lynford and Castlereigh.

The butcher knife had a 10-inch-long silver blade and a black rubber handle.

12 Mile, investigating other accidents late Wednesday and early Thursday.

In one instance, the car that struck the patrol car was only going about five mph when it slid on the icy road, Cranston said.

By Thursday morning, Michigan State Police troopers in Northville had logged at least 25 overnight accidents on area freeways. Many were fenderbenders but troopers also investigated a jack-knifed truck on I-696 near Orchard Lake Road. Countless other vehicles spun into the median.

The freeways were a sheet of ice, but speeds were down and no serious injuries were reported.

"We had so many accidents Wednesday night that everybody from the afternoon shift worked till 3 a.m. and day-shift people came in at 10:30 p.m.," trooper Bruce Karazsia said.
