FARMINGTON With "Exposure to the Arts," Farmington's adult education department will add some new dimensions this coming session which begins Jan. 11. For this and all other classes, registration may be made at Farmington High School Jan. 4, from 7 to 9 p.m. in Room 106D.

The "Exposure" series will be undertaken jointly with the Farmington Community Arts Council and will meet at the high school from 7:30-9:30 p.m. on Tuesdays. The first meeting will deal with painting. Discussion leader will be Mrs. Jan Artson who has studied painting in Europe and has taught at OCC and Cranbrook.

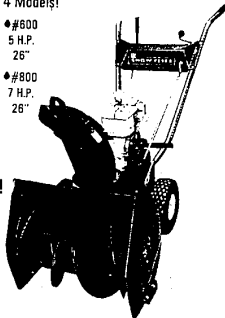

trio which will occupy Briarwood, a large center being built by Taubman in Ann Arbor.

FOR THE PAST three months, Taubman's consultants have been working on producing a satisfactory plan with the township's planning consultants, Vilcan-Leman. Kughn reports a lake is being planned for the eastern section of the project to be used for storm water retention and developed as a small boat recreational area.

The retail center would be a two-level, enclosed air-conditioned mall with four major department stores using about one million square feet and other retail shops using about one-half million square feet of floor area.

The northwest corner of the site is proposed to be used for garden-type apartments with offices nearby. A large motel and three restaurants have been planned for the corner of 13 Mile and Haggerty.

Near the motel and restaurants will be small lakes used for retention basins. Offices and an office-center is planned for along 13 Mile Rd.

A one-acre site has been set aside for a fire station at the corner 13 Mile and Halstead. Just north of the proposed fire station, on the west side of Halstead, 20 acres have been set aside for a hospital. Garden apartments are planned for the rest of Halstead north of the hospital. The site planners have an island area surrounded by an artificial lake with low-rise apartments located throughout the island. Townhouses are envisioned to surround the shore of the artificial lake.

A THEATER, restaurant, convenience center and some offices are planned for south side of the lake plus a community center on the island and a picnic area on a smaller island.

All the developments on the island and surrounding the lake would be connected by a web of pedestrian trails. Kughn has proposed trails to the north of the lake area and east of Halstead and has suggested the waterways could be extended to the single-family residential area.

The total project includes about 67 acres for multiples with about 515 garden apartment units and some 140 townhouse units. The proposed density now being considered is 10 dwelling units per acre.

Before the center is constructed, the 10 Mile sanitary sewer arm will have to be extended west of Haggerty. Kughn also states 13 Mile must be widened to six lanes and HTK would contribute financially to this work.

Kughn says 12 Mile will have to be widened and improved even if the shopping center is not built because the new I-275 expressway will have an interchange at 13 Mile.

Taubman Co. is the general contractor and leasing agent for the proposed center in the township. Architects are Jickling & Lyman of Birmingham.

Township planning commissioners have been holding discussions with HTK officers since last spring. The commission's biggest reservation about the entire project seems to be the proposed density for the apartments.

The commissioners would like a lower density for the multiples and would look favorably upon a reduction from the proposed 10 to six or seven dwelling units per acre.
