Plastic surgery is lecture topic

Vassiloff, board-certified by the American Board of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery, and a member of American

College of Surgeons.

Vassiloff's talk will focus on the newest developments in the field of plastic surgery, now a half-billion dollar industry. He will discuss the increasingly popular liposuction or "fat suctioning," the most widespread form of cosmetic surgery; facial cosmetic surgery; and other ac-

esthetic surgeries available which can reshape facial and bodily features to improve an individual's appearance. There will be ample time set aside for questions.

Wildlife artists called for contest

Contest rules are available now to Michigan wildlife artists who wish to enter paintings for consideration in Michigan's trout/salmon and waterfowl stamp design contests next March.

Artists have until Feb. 27 to submit their entries for the stamp contests, which will be held in conjunction with the Bluebird Festival and Wildlife Art Show, March 11-12, at Jackson Community College in Jackson.

Last year's trout winning entry, the brook trout, and the past three winning duck contest species—Canada goose, green-winged teal and the goldeneye—will not be eligible as a theme for the 1989 contest.

An important new feature in this year's waterfowl stamp competition, will be the selection of two first-

place winners; one for the 1989 waterfowl stamp and the other for the 1990 stamp.

"We'd like to select the winning waterfowl stamp design one year ahead so that stamps are available at the start of the license year in March, rather than in August, as in previous years," said Jerry Martz, DNR waterfowl stamp contest coordinator. "This will also allow artists additional time in the future to produce and distribute art prints of the winning design."

Submitted paintings will be judged March 11. Winning entries will appear on the 1989 and 1990 Michigan waterfowl stamps, purchased by nearly 50,000 duck hunters annually, and the 1990 Michigan trout/salmon, bought by more than 350,000 anglers each year.

stamp entry was painted by Elaine Swanson of Glenn. Swanson is the first woman to win Michigan's annual stamp contest and only the fourth woman to place first in a state-operated stamp contest nationwide. Rochester resident John Martens, was the 1988 Michigan stamp winner with his painting of a pair of Canada geese.
