

Kahn leads North to another city title

It was billed as the Farmington City Meet, but it could have been entitled "The Heather Kahn Gymnastics Show."

Kahn shattered a school record in the vault Wednesday and won the all-around competition with 35.90 points, leading North Farmington to the city title at Farmington Harrison. North was the defending champion.

Farmington placed second with 127.05 points, and Harrison finished a distant third at 113.30.

Kahn's performance on the vault earned her a record-setting score of 9.65.

"You don't see those scores a lot," North coach Jeff Dwyer said. "There wasn't too much wrong with it. She nailed her vault; she was pretty clean on it."

Dwyer added it was the first time this season he has had his whole team together. Kahn was sick earlier in the season, Jameelah Galer was injured and Heller was ineligible after transferring.

Kahn also won the bars (9.05) and the floor exercise (9.0) and tied for third on the beam (8.2).

She wasn't the only North standout. Kim Heller had 34.35 points all-around, finishing second on both the vault (9.2) and the bars (8.9).

Kristin Sutarski also produced impressive numbers, finishing the competition with 33.70 points. She tied for third on the bars (8.55) and floor (8.75) and was fourth on the vault (8.5).

Freshman Christine Oates did her best for Farmington, winning a title on the beam (8.6) and placing second on the floor (8.95). She tied Sutarski for third place on the bars (8.55).

Oates finished behind Heller with an all-around score of 34.00. Teammates Julie Lawton, Debbie Ford and Amber Artuckie also posted fine scores. Lawton was second on beam (8.25), Ford was third on the vault (8.55) and Artuckie tied Kahn for third place on the beam (8.2).

Harrison's top competitors were Jenny Rick on vault (7.9) and floor exercise (7.45), Michelle Doecker on bars (7.25) and Amy Solomon on the beam (7.75).

Mercy mashes Marian

Livonia Ladywood might be a bigger threat in volleyball, but Farmington Hills Mercy enjoyed sweet victory nonetheless Thursday night at Birmingham Marian.

The Oakland County members of the Central Division have developed a strong athletic rivalry in recent years, too, and the Marins won the latest round 15-3, 17-15.

With the victory, Mercy remains in title contention. The Marins are 3-2 in the division and 15-4 overall. The Mustangs fell to 1-4 against Central opponents.

Mercy heads into a key week of Catholic League play, visiting Redford Bishop Borgess on Monday and playing host to Ladywood on Thursday.

Andrea Velthoven had eight kills in 12 attacks to lead the win over Marian. Lee Albrecht had a slightly lower percentage at 8-of-14, and Jennifer Goff was 4-of-11.

Coach Tim DeBelle cited Christy Johnson's defensive play, which included eight digs, and setter Nikki Burns had 20 assists resulting in kills.

NORTH FARMINGTON whipped Livonia Franklin in two games, 15-7, 15-1, without its top attacker, Vikki Seamon, who leads the Raiders in kills.

Others more than filled the void, however. Sophomores Eve Grew was 7-of-8 attacking with four kills.

"She's been playing great for us," coach Sandy Lubienicki said. "Every match she goes out it seems she's a little better."

Courtney Knapp and Donna O'Brien have been steady performers all season. Knapp was 7-of-7 passing, recorded two kills and had seven digs. O'Brien was 9-of-10 attacking with four kills.

Kelly Coulson was the leading server, putting 18 of 19 into play for 17 points, including four aces. Debbie Weintraub had 10 assists, but "there's not much play when you're serving real hard," Lubienicki said.

"The game ends quickly."

The Raiders are 3-0 against Western Lakes teams and 6-1 overall.

FARMINGTON HARRISON'S volleyball team could have picked a better night to experiment.

Harrison coach Ron Shortt changed his offensive strategy Thursday against a more experienced Plymouth Salem team, and it didn't help. Salem drilled the Hawks 15-1, 15-10 in a Western Lakes Activities Association crossover match.

The Hawks went to a 5-2 offense in the first game before moving back to a 6-1 alignment in the second.

Harrison, which scored the first point of the night, eventually fell to

2-5 overall, 1-1 in the WLAA. Salem is 3-1 overall, 2-1 in league play.

She didn't go into the first game expecting to win, even though it was a league game," Shortt said. "We tried some people out in different spots."

"We're a real young team, and we're going through a transition right now. We're going to end up losing some games, but I'm willing to experiment."

North Farmington started slow, but finished strong Thursday at Walled Lake Central, recording a 37-29 win in boys wrestling.

The win was the first in the Lakes Division for the Raiders against three defeats. They are 6-4 overall.

"We've hit with everything," North coach Dick Cook said. "We've had the flu, injuries, even chicken pox holding a kid out."

"We're trying to scrape everybody up for the league meet (Saturday, Jan. 28, at Westland John Glenn)."

Central claimed titles in the first three weight classes before Cook gave his team a wake-up call. By then, the Raiders trailed the Vikings 15-0.

Jack Beall recorded North's first win, whipping Ken Brown 11-4 in the 125-pound class. Brian Walby continued North's success in the 130-pound division, pinning Sean Jaworski at 1:12 and making the score 9-15.

After Central's Anthony Snider (135) recorded a pin and gave the Vikings a 21-9 lead, the Raiders rallied again.

Matt Thompson (140) and Victor Matul (145) had consecutive pins, tying the score for the first time, 21-21. Thompson's pin came at 1:52 and Matul pinned his opponent at 2:37.

Central won the 152 and 160-pound classes and regained the lead, 29-21, before North made a final run at the Vikings.

Jeff Jacobs (171) decisioned Ed Holmes 9-0 to win the 171-pound class and narrow the deficit to four, 25-29.

The Raiders won the meet because of voids in the 189 and heavyweight divisions. Credited with the win at 189 was Jeff Alekman, and Zaim Cunnula was given the points at heavyweight.
