

Hauncher paces Shamrocks' win

CHURCHILL 64, NORTHEAST 45: Mike Jankowski poured in 19 points Tuesday for host Livonia Churchill, which cruised to the easy Western Division win.

The Chargers moved to 2-4 in the division, 4-4 overall. Northville dipped to 1-5, 5-7.

Churchill's defense was the difference. The Chargers led 19-8 after one quarter and continued its dominance in the second eight minutes, building a 33-15 advantage at halftime.

"I thought we played good defense in the first half, we didn't let them get into their offense," Churchill coach Fred Price said.

Jason Belaire and Chad Campman added nine points each for Churchill and Eric Osen contributed seven points and six rebounds. Heath Meyers led Northville with 19 points and Chris House added 12.

ST. AGATHA 70, ST. FLORIAN 58: Redford St. Agatha outscored Hamtramck St. Florian 23-11 in the first quarter Tuesday, providing the difference for the host Aggies in the Catholic League C-D Division game.

Agatha remained in second place in the C-D Division, behind Flint Holy Rosary, with an 8-1 record, 19-1 overall. Florian fell to 5-4 in the division, 7-4 overall.

Mike Boyle finished with 24 points for the Aggies, leading a balanced attack. Gaylen Walker added 20 points and Matt Hagan had 14. George Gjokaj had 21 for the losing team.

St. Agatha would have had an easier time, but managed to make only 13-of-30 free throws. Florian made 13 free throws in 31 tries.

REDFORD CC 67, BISHOP GALLAGHER 61: Redford Catholic Central

rebounded from its disappointing loss last Friday to Redford Bishop, regaining Harper Woods County Gallagher Tuesday at home.

The Shamrocks are 6-1 in the Catholic League's Central Division, 7-5 overall. Gallagher is 1-6 in the league, 5-7 overall.

Scott Hauncher led CC with a season-high 24 points. Terry Boykin added 14 and Jeff Schaner scored eight. Steve Morris led five Gallagher players in double figures with 15 points.

NOTRE DAME 47, BORGESS 45 (OT): Less than 15 minutes to overtime and Redford Bishop Borgess had just scored Tuesday at Harper Woods Notre Dame. The Spartans still trailed by two, but they stole the ball and got off a game-tying shot. Then they got off another, and another. All three missed.

Borgess' Shawn Russell had forced the OT, tying the score with 35 left in regulation. Notre finished with 21 points. Charles North added nine for the Spartans (8-4 overall, 4-2 in the Catholic League's Central Division). Notre Dame got 15 points from Clarence Hunter, 12 from Bernard Richmond and 10 from Eric Taylor.

LUTHERAN NORTH 60, CVILLE 48: Free throw shooting cost Livonia Clarenceville any chance for victory Tuesday at Mount Clemens Lutheran North.

North (4-8 overall, 2-4 in the Metro Conference) led 39-37 entering the final period. The Trojans went 9-for-8 from the line in the quarter. North was 13-of-15. For the game, Clarenceville hit just seven-of-20, while North was 18-of-23.

Derrick Herx's 15 points and eight rebounds led the Trojans (4-8 overall, 2-4 in the Metro). Gary Loy added 10 points. Dave May had 18 points for North, with Rob Wengler collecting 17.

Eagles soar to tourney victory

James Curtis and Jim Butcher got St. Mary's College of Orchard Lake started in the right direction against Dyke College (Cleveland, Ohio) in the Aquinas College Classic basketball tournament final Saturday in Grand Rapids.

Curtis began the game by driving in for a layup. Butcher scored the next eight points on two three-pointers and two free throws, awarded after a pair of technical fouls called against Dyke. Curtis added two more drives for baskets and the Eagles were off to a 16-0 lead — and there was still 18:30 left in the first half.

It never improved for Dyke, which slipped to 6-12 with the 115-81 trouncing. It was the Eagles' third-consecutive victory, and their second-straight tournament championship.

Six players reached double figures in scoring for St. Mary's. Jerome Washburn and Butcher got 20 points apiece (Washburn also had 14 rebounds). Curtis finished with 17 points and 10 assists. James Lakes scored 14, and Denny Butcher and Kevin Nicfield netted 10 apiece, with Nicfield grabbing 13 boards.

James Williams topped Dyke with 17 points.

THE WIN Improved the Eagles' record to 12-10, with an important NAIA District 23 game Saturday at Siena Heights in Adrian. The Saints are atop the district power ratings, boasting an 18-5 record and a 5.35 power-points rating. St. Mary's is fourth with a 4.43 power-points average. In between are Hillsdale (4.69) and Saginaw Valley State (4.59).

A win is imperative if the Eagles are to entertain any hopes of catching Siena Heights.

In Friday's tournament opener, Garth Howard led five Eagles in double-figures, scoring 25 points in St. Mary's 101-63 pasting of Grand Rapids School of Bible and Music. Dyke upset Aquinas 105-103 to advance to the championship round.

Others to reach double-figures in scoring for St. Mary's were Mike Moroney with 18, Jeff Suspek, 12; Jim Butcher, 11; and Don Edwards, 10. Washburn led the rebounders with nine.

Darwin Parman's 32 points led Grand Rapids Bible. Doug Kliever scored 14.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING JANUARY 23, 1989

Mayor Sever opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on January 23, 1989 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Mayor Sever, Mayor Pro Tem Fox, Arnold, Scronen, and Vagstad. Members absent: Alkaeb and Marks. Others present: City Manager Cortick, City Clerk Dornan, Assistant City Manager Call, Director of Public Service Basell, and City Attorney Elbeau.

Council adopted Ordinance No. 4, to Proceed with the installation of sanitary sewer improvement for Roller Road (from 650 ft. north of 12 Mile to 1,188 ft. north of 12 Mile) Resolution No. 6, Notice of Intent to Issue Bonds; and, agreed to install the Alycayak outfall sanitary sewer and establish a payback district of \$44,000.00 and utilize monies from the Interceptor Fund to uphold the costs of the payback proposal.

Council enacted Ordinance C-1-89, Zoning Text Amendment No. 8, 1988, to amend Sections 60.201 of the City Code by adding definitions, and to add a new Section 60.233, Protection of Trees, including landmark trees.

Council enacted Ordinance C-2-89, Zoning Text Amendment No. 8, 1988, to amend Section 60.408 of the City Code, One-Family Clustering Option. Council established sanitary sewer and water main payback district for Haggerty Road, north of Grand River and south of 149th.

Council re-approved Final Plat for Arbor Farms Subdivision. Council waived sidewalk construction on Tuck Road, frontage of Arbor Farms Subdivision, until January 9, 1991.

Council approved Final Plat for "The Orchards Corporate Center" Subdivision. Council set public hearing date of February 27, 1989 for review of the 1989/90 Community Development Block Grant Program.

Council agreed to hold executive session immediately following the meeting to discuss property acquisition. Council adopted resolution recognizing Farmington Artists Club as a non-profit organization.

Meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.
