● MOONLIGHT SKI TOUR
If you're looking for something new and different to do, here it is. Cross-country ski beautiful Heritage Park bay moonlight. Ski rental is available for this special event 7-10 p.m. Friday, Jan. 20. Ski rental fee is \$8.

● NATURE STUDY

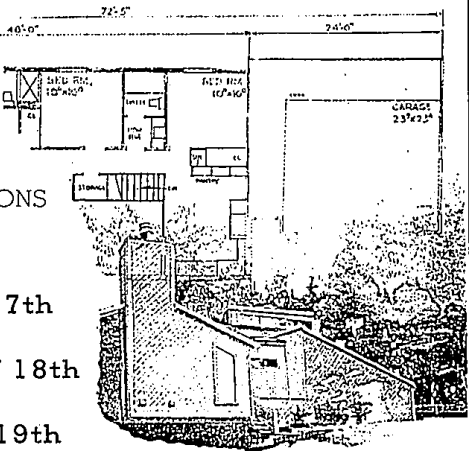

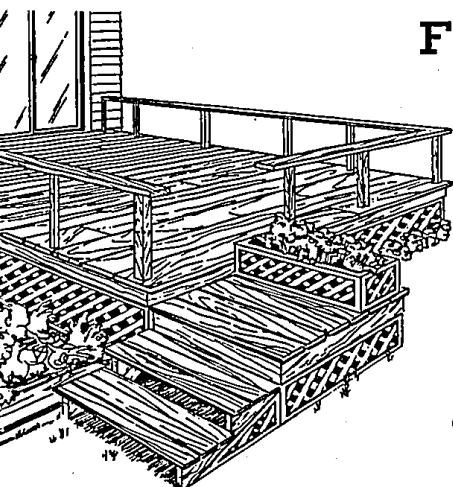

Program Year 1989-90

The Department of Housing and Urban Development has advised the City of Farmington Hills that it is entitled to receive approximately \$309,000.00 for the 1989-90 Community Development Block Grant Program Year. These funds have been authorized by the Department of Housing and Urban Development under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 and 1977, as amended. In addition, an estimated \$30,000.00 will be received in program income from the Housing Rehabilitation activities.

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, February 27, 1989, at 7:30 p.m., Eastern Standard Time, in the Council Chamber of the City Hall, 31555 Eleven Mile Road, City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, at which time and place the Farmington Hills City Council will conduct a Public Hearing to discuss the proposed use of Community Development Block Grant funds. The proposed statement of Community Development objectives and projected use of funds for the 1989-90 CDBG Program Year is as follows:

PROPOSED STATEMENT OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM 1989-90
City of Farmington Hills

The City of Farmington Hills has considered the various eligible projects which may be undertaken with Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. These activities range from construction of sidewalks, storm/sanitary sewers, water lines and street paving to public services, code enforcement, historic preservation, etc. After careful evaluation of these projects, it has been determined that the highest priority of needs for low and moderate income areas of the community would be achieved through the following expenditure of CDBG funds:

Housing Rehabilitation	\$191,000.00* 57%	\$197,000.00** 58%
Capital Improvements	101,000.00 30%	100,000.00 30%
Administration	42,000.00 13%	42,000.00 12%
	\$333,000.00* 100%	\$339,000.00** 100%

*Includes \$36,000.00 of program income
**Includes \$30,000.00 of program income and designates \$20,000.00 for a Rental Housing Rehabilitation Program.

Capital Improvement projects for possible consideration include:

1. Robinson and Parker Paving and Drainage Improvements (Section 34) \$100,000.00
2. Regal Orchards Subdivision Drainage Improvements (North of Nine Mile Road) (Section 26) \$292,000.00
3. Randall Drainage Improvement (Section 33) \$81,000.00
4. Grayling Storm System Improvements (Section 36) \$51,000.00

Please note that only a portion of these projects could be completed due to the funding levels. It is felt, however, that an opportunity for public discussion should be given on these projects.

All projects proposed with the use of the 1989-90 CDBG funds, as noted above, will benefit low and moderate income areas or persons defined in the 1980 Census.

All CDBG activities have been designed to avoid the displacement of persons. In the event displacement becomes necessary, the City will assist displaced persons in accordance with the Federal Uniform Relocation Act.

1989-89 CDBG Program - The Final Statement of Community Development Objectives and Projected Use of Funds for 1989-89 included the above distribution of funds. It is anticipated that on June 1, 1989, the end of the Program Year, that the status of the expenditures will be as follows:

- Administration - 100% expended
- Capital Improvements - Robinsonwood Storm Sewer Improvements 100% expended
- Grand River Sidewalk Repair 100% expended
- Parker Drainage Improvements Cancelled
- Housing Rehabilitation - 100% expended or committed

Also, no persons will be displaced.

The public is invited to comment on the proposed use of Block Grant funds and the City's participation in the Community Development Block Grant Program.
