'Ridge' Artist, Tazian, Exhibits 40 Works

FARMINGTON Kephah Tazian is an artist who considers himself part fisherman and hunter.

"Just like a fisherman and hunter, I look for live things to use as the models for my work," he says.

Tazian has taught painting, design and life drawing for three years at Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge Campus, Farmington Township.

On April 3, one of his works, "Agony," won a \$100 prize from the Michigan Academy of Arts and Letters.

This work, a fiber-glass sculpture head study and a col-

lage oil painting, was displayed at the Academy's 28th annual art exhibition at Wayne State University.

Tazian isn't new at having his works displayed. In 1968, his work was exhibited at a national show at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind.

Tazian, who was born and raised in Beirut, Lebanon, said that the subject of his work and his choice of colors reflect his Armeian heritage.

"An artist has to be true to his experience and environment and heritage," he says.

He received his B.A. and

M.A. degrees from St. Francis College, Fort Wayne, Ind., and his Master's of Fine Arts degree from Wayne State University.

His work will be displayed in a one-man show at the Birmingham Art Gallery for approximately three weeks beginning May 17. More than 40 works of different media will be exhibited.

Tazian adds that he enjoys sculpture better than other art forms, "because it is more challenging than two-dimensional work."

NFH Typist Wins Prize

FARMINGTON Debby Drall, a 10th grader at North Farmington High School, distinguished herself recently by placing sixth in the Metropolitan Detroit Typing Contest.

Miss Drall was the only 10th grader in competition with 11th and 12th grade typists from 60 public and parochial

Her prize for winning was an electric hair dryer.

Miss Drall then competed in a nationwide typing contest with contestants from 2,000 schools, and her results were a 100 percentile. For this she will receive a gold certificate.

Cleveland was honored for heroic action in combat while serving with the 1st Cavalry Division. It is his second tour in Vietnam after being seriously injured in combat there in 1968.

Mr. and Mrs. Kelsch and their son were honored at a joint service Memorial Day banquet in May 1968.

Kelsch, who attended Farmington High School and entered the U.S. Army in 1966, has also earned the air medal, two purple hearts and the Army commendation medal.
