

How Committee Reached Sex Ed Conclusions

FARMINGTON The human sexuality task group, a subcommittee of the Family Life Education (FLE) committee, recently completed a report which describes a sex education program for Farmington public schools.

The task group said it was responding to the widespread view that "public schools should accept a broader responsibility in the area of family life and sex education."

THE TASK GROUP found "considerable evidence indicates the majority of children don't receive meaningful concepts of human sexuality from their parents."

"Many parents simply ignore the area of sex education; some are not emotionally equipped to provide the education necessary, some have negative attitudes which they cannot overcome, some don't have the adequate knowledge."

IN DEVELOPING the human sexuality program, the task group accepted the definition of sex education as set out in the Michigan Public Acts of 1955.

The acts state that "sex education is the preparation for personal relationships between the sexes by providing appropriate educational opportunities designed to help the individual develop understanding, acceptance, respect and trust for himself and others."

"Sex education includes the knowledge of physical, emotional and social growth and maturation, and understanding of the individual's needs."

"It involves an examination of man's and woman's roles in society, how they relate and react to supplement each other, the responsibilities of each toward the other throughout life and the development of responsible use of human sexuality as a positive and creative force."


