That the North swimmers defeated crosstown rival Farmington 108-64 and won their first Lakes Division championship in the Western Lakes Activities Associations.

championship in the Western Lakes Activities Associa-tion were of secondary importance. More significantly, the Raiders made history by achieving their first perfect record – a 11-0 slate – in the school's 20 years of interscholastic swim competi-tion.

"At the beginning of the season, we dreamt of this," said tri-capital Doug Schwedland, who also serves as North's spiritual leader.

Rob Kunzelman, a diver and one of only seven sentors on the squad, was a part of two state champlonship teams at Dearborn High before transferring to North last year, but the camaraderic among the Raiders surpasses that of his former teammates.

"Doug gave us a speech in the locker room and fired us all up." he said. "A team becomes so close when you have a leadere like that.

"Diving has always been considered a separate sport," Kunzelman said, "but a feam like this is like a family."
