And Southwestern Prospectors lived up to their billing and appear ready to break their sevenyear Jim in the state tournament in which they we dropped the stright Cooley.

"They're a buze saw of a team," said CC coach Bernie Holowick of the Prospectors. "They're methodical, they cut you up like a surgeon. They move the ball well and get good shots. They're very selective and very well disciplined. When you break their game down, overy part is good."
