"Rocket-to-the-Pocket" would describe an exceptionally powerful shot, while the "Anchor Man" is the last man in the lineup (it could also be a woman).

"This means all the hard work, getting up at 5 in the morning, has been worth it," Gendron said. "The kids have come through when we needed them to. They've been real together all year, real supportive of each other."

In addition to Turney, Drelles and Knoche, another key team member, Chuck Chuba, won the 50 and 100 freestyles in 23.64 and 52.31, respectively. Junior Dan Knipper won the 200 freestyle (1:54.76).

In THE MEDLEY relay, it was Drelles, Knoche, Turney and Chuba posting a 1:45.22 time, and Jerry Jehle, Knipper, Knoche and Turney won the freestyle relay in 3:31.42.

Farmington was not without its highlights, either. Brad Moore gave the Falcons first place in the Individual medley (2:10.58), and G.T. Meili won the 300 freestyle in 5:08.25.

"What I think is important is that everybody on the team contributed. It wasn't a couple of superstars; everybody scored points."

The biggest excitement of the meet occurred in diving in which North's Kunzelman and John Juliano thrilled the crowd when they performed several difficult dives to near perfection.

Kunzelman won the event with a career-high point total of 250.25. Juliano was second with a best-ever 228.95. As an indication of the quality of their performances, Juliano's score was better than Kunzelman's previous best (228.75) going into the meet.

"THOSE KIDS nailed those dives," Gendron said. "They were on tonight. They were hot."

Dutchie said, "I want to attribute that to Rob Hood, who comes here on his own to coach," Kunzelman said. "Even though I perform the dives, I have to attribute it to him."

"He helps you visualize. I can stand there before each dive and feel the confidence building."

North's next challenge comes this week in the WLAAM meet. The prelims are at 2 p.m. Wednesday, the

diving 4 p.m. Thursday and the finals 7 p.m. Friday. All three days of competition will take place at Salem.

The Rocks and Western Division champion Plymouth Canton are expected to be North's main competition. The Raiders were sixth last year, and their previous WLAAM best was a third-place finish.

"We think it's a toss-up," Gendron said. "If we swim great, we can win it. It depends on how everybody swims."
