# 'Teacher on TV' pilot moves ahead

A new program allowing low en-rollment classes at the three Farmington high schools to be linked by cable may begin as soon as this fall. Called "Teacher on TV," the pro-gram is being tested throughout the districted

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Officials say without the program, classes taught only at one school might not be offered, or students would be bused between schools, which is the current policy. The shrinking number of students in certain classes may become worse in future years because of overall declining enrollment in high-schools.

"I'm really excited we ape doing this," said trustee Helon Prutow, who also serves on the Oakland County Intermediate School board. "I look forward to the time when we can hook in with other districts. Interactive TV in unlimited. I feet this is the future."

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Trustees were given a sampling of the program Feb. 28. Although they did not vote to approve the program, plans are to continue with the pilot and prepare final plans — including the proposed biring of a production manager.

TRUSTEES ARE expected to vote at a future meeting, probably during the 1989-90 budget process, when dollar figures are attached to

the final plans.

The pilot, which began last fall, has involved more than 300 students with various tessons.

"Kids find it to be eventful—they don't feel inhibited by the camera," said Peggy Schmidt, director of media resources for the district.

Farmington has studied programs in others districts, including neighboring Waited Lake Consolidated Schools, she said.

Only certain classes would work work with the "Teacher on TV" approach, according to telecommunications coordinator Dean Color work with the "Teacher on TV", and the pilot program.

"I'm not a tremendous advocate of a hands-on approach, host overything will work on TV," he said.
"We realize that."

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THE NEW program uses live remotes from classrooms at school buildings and the TV-10 cable sold out North Farmington. If approved as a permanent program designated classrooms would be set up at each high school and would be include fascimile equipment for transmitting homework assignments.

transmitting homework assign-ments.

The proposed production mana-ger would cost the district upwards of \$20,000 and would coordinate classroom and production sched-ules, and train teachers on the new process, said deputy superintend-ent Michael Flanagan.




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
