# Cops: Fracchia threatened girl

In the week before she was found murdered, police say Kristina Marie Fracehla made several threatening elephone calls to a teenage girl in West Bloomfield.

Apparently, both were girliriends of Anthony Joseph Bonelli, a 17-year-old Farmington Hills youth charged with open murder in the drowning death of Fracchia, 17, also of Farmington Hills.

Bonelli will face a preliminary examination at 9 am. Thursday, March 30, before Judge Edward Avadenka in 48th District Court, Bloomfield Township.

FRACCHIA'S FULLY clothed body was found by county drain commission workers 9:30 a.m. Fri-day floating face up in 18 inches of water, 50 feet from the north shore

of Orchard Lake in the city of Orchard Lake Village. They were inspecting a water-level control pump. An autopsy revealed that Fracchia and drowned. Toxicology tests are incomplete. Police believe Fracchia and Bonelli drove to the Orchard Lake site Wednesday night, March 15, in Fracchia's car, and that she died there that evening.

### Murder suspect testifies: 'I didn't want her to leave me'

Nearly 39 months to the day after killing his bride of six weeks, Jon Vermeulen's fate is now in the hands of jurors, who must decide whether the death of Urime Lewis Vermeulen was a tragic accident by a suicidal husband or premeditated murder by a spurned mate.

Vermeulen is charged with first-degree murder and felony firearms possession in the shooting death of the woman he knew as "Renae" on Dec. 28, 1985, in the couple's two-bedroom unit at Muliwood Apartments in Farmington Hills. He is
