Salem coach Chuck Olson was named Observerland coach of the year after leading the flocks to their second straight WLAA title. Salem was 9-2 in dual meets.

Kerry Doran played a big role in making the Farmington Hills-based team's comeback possible. The North Farmington student won four individual state titles in the 15-16 girls competition. Her victories came in the 200-yard breaststroke, 200 butterfly, 200 individual medley and 200 freestyle. Gwen Rowlands also won the 100 freestyle to help the Stingrays capure the 15-16 girls title and contribute 377 points to the team total.

Karapetian swam 21.73 in the 50 freestyle to break the record of 21.93 set by Mark Loveland of Ann Arbor. He also achleved his junior national qualifying time.

Arbor. He also achieved his junior national qualitying time. In the 100 freestyle, Karapetian went 48.01 to cellipse former Stingrays swimmer Scott Christies mark of 48.02. His other victories came in the 200 IM (2:02.10), 100 butterfly (54.30) and 100 breaststroke (1:01.88).

BBA coach Bob Jenrow said. "He

note."

Karapetian, who was second in the 200 breaststruke, didn't stop here, however. He helped the At-lantis 400 freestyle relay team set a state record, too.

The foursome of Karapetian, Eric Matuszak, Mike O'Hara and Kevin Hafner won the race in 3:2240, breaking the record also owned by the BBA of 3:2241.

The Stingrays fared well in 15-16 boys, also. They came close to winning that age group with David Notarius (distance freestyle and butterfly). Danny Knipper (100 and 200 breaststroke) and Eric Newton (400 IM and middle distance freestyle) having good meets.

In the girls 17-18 division, Christie Duthie won the 200 butterfly and 100 freestyle, and Clndy Grestyle, and the 150 and 200 breaststrokes. Linda Goldstein won the 1,550 freestyle in girls 13-14, and Tom Swaninger took top honors in the 13-14 boys 200 breaststroke.


"They completely outnumbered us and had a lot of good people in the older age groups. The Stingrays swam real well. I give a lot of credit to them and their coaching staff."
