cy. We will try to be uniform and fair and review our policies," city manager William Costick said to the council Mondy.

"He said the administration will prepare a revised policy for council consideration in a few weeks.

Councilman Philip Arnold suggested that in the future, such documents be issued with appropriate time lines and other rules.

COSTICK SAID a memo prohibit-ing TCOs had been posted at the city hall since 1986 to discourage build-ers and developers from requesting them authough the city continued to

issue them as needed. That year, there was beavy development activity in the city.

"I think we still need to issue TCOs," Costick added. "But the time limit idea. . . is a good one."

limit idea. . . is a good one."
Marka, a velcram councilman and local developer, was absent from Monday's council meeting. Marks has contended he received to special treatment from the City or TOOs, despite such charges by city activist Lucila Hempet. Marks has 12 items to complete on his building before a permanent occupancy certificate will be issued.

Most TCOs are issued for unfin-ished litems around the building's ex-terior, not the interior. And most de-velopers handle these punch-list items within one building season, ac-cording to a report given to the coun-cil Monday.

"TM NOT going to defend the building across the street," Costick and during his report. "Two seasons have gone by."
About \$2,500 in terms have yet to be completed so the Marks building, which the councilman has promised will be completed in 30-30 days.
"I would hope ... that he would

take care of these team as soon he can," said councilman Aldo Vag-nozzi. "I don't understand why be doesn't take care of it. It does reflect on this council. It's starting to bother

Mayor Terry Sever, who has

because of lead soldering used for
lead-lined tanks, according to the
EPA. Lead is a tosic metal that
can be harmful to bealth causing

tem damage.

The EPA reported that more than a million school water four-tains still have lead components and may cause a health risk to youngsters.

THE EPA has no authority to or-der school district testing, but a law enacted last year requires states to assist districts in testing

for lead in drinking water. This law apparently led to Farmington's at-tention to the matter.

Kemron Environmental Services, a Farmington Hills company did testing for the Farmington district. This is the same company contracted by the district to move or repair mandatory asbestos problems, as required by law.
