

# North rebuilds squad after losing top talent

Like most of his colleagues in the ceaching profession, North Farmington boys tennis ceach Rick Jones asia his players to stain certain goals.

The most reasonable goal Jones might want the Raidens to meet this spring is making it to practice on time. Duplicating last year's 11-0 dual-meet record in Western Lakes Activities Association play might be too much to ak. The Raiders opened the season with a 5-2 loss Friday to Southfield Lathrup, so Jones knows this season might be a struggle.
