The latest Oakland County in-volved a raccoon in Springifield Township, north of Clarkston. The raccoon was in a family's yard dur-ing the day and "tangled with the family dog," Anderson said.

Animal control officers caught the raccoon and shipped it to Lansing, where it tested positive for rables. The dog had been vaccinated for ra-bies, however, and was unaffected Anderson noted.

"It was the first in 10 years," An-derson said of the rabid raccoon.

said. But the Springfield Township incident puts him on the alert because "my own biggest fear is that rables will get into the domestic animal" population, Anderson said. That's what happened in Mayville, where farm pets hadn't been vaccinated.

Similarly, Anderson fears Oakland County pet owners haven't adequate-ly protected their pets against the

County per owners a read a stack as the disease.

"About 40 to 50 percent of dogs and cats are vaccinated against rabies" he said. "The World Health Organization guidelines recommend at least 70 percent of the animals be vaccinated to prevent a rables epidemic."

Raccoons and skunks may carry a bigger bite than a dog since they could be infected with rables. The best way to avoid a possible roblem is to be prepared by having sets innoculated, Anderson said. familiar to most people, and dumb

THE RABIES innoculation for pupples is good for one year in dogs under six months of age, said Dr. Fred Gasow of Gasow Vetrinary Clinic in Birmingham. Shots for dogs a year or oldri are good for three

years.
Rabies immunizations for cats,
however, are only good for one year,
Gasow said.
Anderson noted that there are two
types of rabies — the furious rables

rables.
"The animal just gets very lethargic, just lays around and drools," Anderson sald of dumb rables.
With dumb rables, a wild animal
spech as a raccoon or fox would appear tame enough to touch, but again
Anderson warns, "Don't!"
If the animal is behaving strangely Anderson sald to call the local animal control officer, or his office in
Oakland County to pick it up.

THERE'S NO cure for rables, a virus that attacks the central per-

vous system and destroys the brain, Anderson said. It's always fatul within 10 days for unvaccionated animals. Unless treated immediately in humans, the disease is fatal within 14 days.


A person bitten by a suspected rabid animal should wash the wound immediately with soap and water, then get medical attention.

Anderson also attessed capturing or killing the animal.

"Don't shoot it in the head or smash the skull," he said. The head of the animal is preserved and sent to Lansing for testing.

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
