Hills lawyer found guilty in insurance fraud scam

A Farmington Hills attorney was convicted of defraiding a Southfield insurance company of \$6,500 by resurrecting a claim for a death ben-efit denied two years earlier. On April 7, an Oakhand County Cir-cuit Court jury found Thomas A. Smith guilty of faiso pretenses over \$100 and conspiracy to commit gross fraud and cheats for taking part in a scheme to defraud American Way Insarance Co. of Southfield of \$157,000 in already-denied death benefits.

benefits. Smith. 44, who represented him-self, denied he knowingly defrauded the insurance company. He stands to lose his license to practice law be-

cause of the felony conviction. Assistant Oakland County pro-secutor Errol Shifman said Smith signed a claim-payment check for an estate he didn't represent. The death occurred in 1984.

TWO OTHERS were previously convicted in the scam, Salfman said. Robert Earl Revers, 34, of Farm-ington Hills, and James Alvin Robin-son, 39, of Detroit pleaded guilty to 24 counts of conspiracy to commit gress fraud and cheats and 24 counts of lakes pretenses over \$100. Revers entered ha pies June 18 and Robin-son Nov. 28 in Circuit Judge Francis X. O'Brien's courtroom.
