Cast hypnotized to give smoother performances

On stage or back stage, Farmington Players who are involved in the production of "Pack of Lies" have been hypnotized to make the performances go smoothly and easily on all fronts this spring.

The hypnotist was Farmington Hills Dr. Jude Cotter who has been gathering research data on single session group hypnosis for the past five years.

"Pack of Lies" is running now on weekends through May 13 and at the end of the run, surveys taken from the cast and crew who were hypnotized will become part of Cotter's research findings.

"This is a different kind of a role than I've ever had," said Jan Salisbury, a veteran player who has the female lead in the play. "We all got our tapes to take home and play and I was happy for the help."

The "different kind of role" Salisbury referred to in "Pack of Lies" was "one of feelings," she said.

"The play was based on a true story and maybe that's why the feelings are not only so important, but so strong," she said.

The feelings concern a family who are asked by Scotland Yard to spy on their neighbors. The neighbors are best friends.

THE ENTIRE PLAY revolves

about the moral issue of where does one's obligations lie; in this instance, to one's country or to one's friends.

The true incident occurred in London in 1960-61. A television play called "Act of Betrayal," based on the event, was aired on BBC television in 1971. "Pack of Lies" grew out of that script, written by Hugh Whitmore.

Jan Salisbury and Ralph Rosati take the roles of Barbara and Bob Jackson, asked to spy on their friends Helen and Peter Kroger portrayed by Judie Rosati and Lucien Chocran.

As the Jacksons respond to Scotland Yard's request they are swept up into a cold-war whirlpool of spying, deceit and betrayal. The moral dilemma ultimately causes Barbara Jackson to suffer a nervous breakdown.

The play is directed by Bill Salisbury.

Others in the cast are Alicia Bewernitz, Mike Megerian, Kerri Langen and Margaret Gilkes.

Curtain time is 8 p.m. for Thursday through Saturday performances in the Players Barn, 32332 12 Mile.


NATIONAL MUSIC WEEK
