

Falcons trample North to win No. 6

Farmington won its sixth girls soccer game of the season without a loss Monday, blanking North Farmington 7-0.

North, 2-3 overall, is hoping to attain at least six wins by the end of the season, and maybe finish with a .500 record.

"We're still looking at a chance to finish 5-0 and that would be a real accomplishment," said North coach Matt Davis, who wasn't awarded Farmington. "They probably deserve their ranking in the state, but they don't deserve to be as high as they are. They've got to work to get, as we all do."

Carrie Maler was a top-notch performer, however, for No. 3-ranked Farmington, scoring three goals.

Kim Popyk had two goals, and Amy Trunk and Jody Ferris scored one each.

Debbie Westerkamp and Kristen Soper shared the goalkeeper duties for the Falcons, who bombarded North goalie Leanne Adie with more than 40 shots.

Farmington coach Cathy Cole said the Falcons didn't play as inspired as she'd have liked coming off last Friday's thrilling, 2-1 win over state-ranked Livonia Stevenson.

Farmington falls victim to late rally

Coach John Gravlin and his Plymouth Salem baseball team were long on endurance Monday.

That attribute almost cost the Rocks a victory in their game with visiting Farmington, but Salem eventually used it to its advantage.

In one of the most dramatic games of the young season, Salem survived an eight-run sixth inning by the Falcons and rallied to defeat Farmington 12-11 in 10 innings.

After the Rocks scored five runs in the bottom of the fifth, junior pitcher Rob Kowalski took an 8-3 lead into the sixth, but Farmington stormed back in its next at-bat to wipe out the deficit.

Gravlin stayed with Kowalski until Kevin VanOrd smashed a two-out, two-run double to put the Falcons in front 9-8.

"We were hoping Robbie could go out there and throw seven," Gravlin said. "He's been known to get stronger. (Assistant coach) Dale Rumberger and I feel we did not coach the best game we could have today."

Chad Johnson relieved Kowalski and gave up three straight hits, including Eric Miller's RBI single and Chris Schmidt's RBI double, before getting Geoff Coderia to strike out and end the uprising.

Johnson settled down after that rough start and allowed no runs over the next four innings, picking up the victory in his first outing for the Rocks.

With the mound situation stabilized, Salem forced the game into extra innings with three runs in the last of the seventh.

Kevin Beals, who hit a grand slam during the five-run fifth, led off the inning with a solo homer off Schmidt, who left in favor of Norm Celinske after allowing a single by Tom Noonan and walking Brian Connell.

Noonan was forced at third on a fielder's choice by Dave Mackowiec, and Brian Rudolph's sacrifice bunt put men at second and third. Connell and Mackowiec raced home to tie the score on Dennis Hanson's single to right field.

In the bottom of the 10th, Eric Sheehan doubled and scored the winning run when the Falcons tried to throw him out at third on Dave Noonan's sacrifice bunt, but the Farmington fielder threw the ball away instead.

VanOrd, who tied the game 3-3 with an RBI single in the top of the fifth, was 3-for-4 with two RBIs. Miller was 3-for-5, including a solo home run, scored three runs and drove in two. Scott Lakatos was 2-for-3, Green 2-for-4 and Schmidt 2-for-5. Chris Adams contributed a two-run double in the sixth.
