

Hawks notch key division win

Farmington Hills Harrison cleared a major hurdle in its first Western Division girls dual meet Thursday.

The Hawks knocked off Livonia Churchill, the runner-up in the Western Lakes Activities Association last year, 77-58 on the Harrison track. It marked the first time in four years Harrison has beaten the Chargers.

"You look at our division, and a couple teams are always good," coach Mark Babcock said. "Churchill is one of them."

"We know this would be a tough one and if we could get by this one we'd be up there. Hopefully, we'll be in the hunt."

"The girls set a lot of goals, and winning the division is very important to them," he said.

The Hawks were led by senior Jane Peters, who was a double winner in the hurdles and anchored two winning relay teams.

Peters did the 100-meter hurdles in 16.8 and the 300 hurdles in 49.0. She also carried the baton across the finish line in the 800 and 1,600 relays.

Heather Connelley, Carrie Hentnik, Nivlin Hakim and Peters ran 1:56 in the 800, and Maria Chalogiannis, Hakim, Audra Cockerham and Peters completed the 1,600 in 4:22.8.

"Peters and Chalogiannis are seniors who have never beaten Churchill, and today was a special day for them," Babcock said. "I know they feel good about winning this meet, and I think the

team will have a positive outlook about the rest of the season."

Harrison also won the 400 relay in which Connelley, Hakim and Hentnik combined with Nicole Leo to post a 3:4.8 time.

Hentnik was a winner in the 200 dash as well, clocking 28.2, and Jeannie Klotzer gave the Hawks first place in the 3,200 run with a 13:29 time.

In the field events, Harrison's Almee Jarvenpaa won the shot put at 27 feet, 10 1/2 inches, and Jill Rosenthal was first in the discus at 87 feet, 10 inches.

Churchill's Charlotte Garry won the high jump (5-0) and 800 run (2:40), and Aiysha Belaire won the 100 dash (13.2) and 400 run (1:03.4). Amy Middistat captured the 1,600 run (8:06).

FARMINGTON WON its Lakes Division debut and stayed unbeaten Thursday with an 89-39 abjecting of host Walled Lake Central. The Falcons are 2-0 overall.

The highlight for Farmington was Jennifer Kie's victory in the 1,600 run in which she defeated Central's Colleen Yuh, an outstanding distance runner and cross country individual champion last fall.

Kie, who was a double winner with a victory in the 3,200 as well, ran a career best 5:30.1 in the 1,600 to Yuh's 5:41.4. Kie's time for 3,200 meters was 12:18.

The Falcons won four other individual events but swept the relays.

Two of those solo winners, Jennifer Reed and Shellie Gaul, combined with Carrie Maier and Angie Forge to win the 400 relay in 52.7. Reed also won the 100 dash in 12.7, and Gaul was a double winner in the hurdles with 16.3 and 52.6 times.

Maier and Forge also teamed up with Nicole Tocco and Amy Trunk — the usual 800-meter foursome — to win that event in 1:54.

Cheryl Castoroli, Maureen O'Dell, Gretchen Clapton and Kristy Bodary won the 1,600 relay in 4:38, and the all-freshman group of Sheri Vitale, Tiffany Katusian, Jody Van Ord and Carrie Walter set a first-place finish in the 3,200 relay with an 11:44 time.

Farmington's lone winner in the field events was Julie Lenton, the top high jumper in Overhead, who captured top honors with a jump of 4 feet, 10 inches.

DOUBLE WINNER Lisa Rives set a school record in the 3,200-meter run for North Farmington, but the achievement came in a losing cause Thursday as the Raiders were beaten 91 1/2-38 1/2 by visiting Livonia Stevenson.

Rives ran 12:10.3 to win the 3,200, breaking Donna Chubb's two-year-old mark of 11:11.6. Rives also was first in the 1,600 with a 5:45.8 time.

North's Jenny Welch captured the 800 run in 2:35.1, Julie Ewing the 100 dash in 13.7 and Gail Grewe the high jump at 4 feet.

Diane Sherwood won the long jump (14-3 1/2) and 300 hurdles (51.4) for the Spartans, who are 1-0 in the Lakes Division, and teammate Lisa Christensen won the 100 hurdles (18.0) and 300 dash (17.3). Stevenson's Jessica Martin was a double winner in the shot put (34-1 1/2) and the discus (107-0).

The Spartans swept the relays, winning the 3,200 in 10:55.1, the 400 in 54.7, the 800 in 15.1 and the 1,600 in 4:30.1.

Errors costly for North, Mercy

Five North Farmington errors resulted in five unearned runs and a Walled Lake Central victory Friday in girls softball, 7-5.

A three-run fourth inning keyed the Vikings' seventh WAAA win without a loss, and two Raider errors helped keep the inning going. Debbie Weintraub was the losing pitcher; she gave up eight hits and five walks, striking out two.

Tiffany Fishell and Eve Clear each drove in two runs with a double for North. Amy Fletcher also had a double, and Weintraub had a single and an RBI. The defeat dropped the Raiders to 4-3, both overall and in the Lakes Division.

On Wednesday, Pam Greaser slugged a grand slam home run in an eight-run fifth inning to propel North past Farmington 13-4. Greaser finished with two hits and two stolen bases.

Courtney Knapp added a two-run double in the fifth, scored two runs and stole three bases, and Fishell had a hit and two RBIs. Fishell, Weintraub and Jennifer Lydon all pitched for the Raiders, with Weintraub getting the win.

Lisa Rockafellow was the losing pitcher; she allowed 13 runs (eight earned) on eight hits and five walks. Rockafellow's bases-loaded double drove in two of Farmington's runs. Michelle Miller com-



tributed two hits for the Falcons.

REGINA 11-9, MERCY 0-2: The host Marlinas experienced the same troubles as North in the first game of Thursday's Catholic League double-header.

Mercy committed 14 errors in the five-inning contest and never recovered, making another six errors in the unsuccessful nightcap.

Amy Edward, who pitched a pair of no-hitters Tuesday when the Hawks swept the Bishop Bergers was the loser in both games. Regina had six hits in the opener and nine in the second, and Edward walked five and three, respectively.

Mercy had just two hits in each game. Kerry Sayers was 2-for-2 in the first game and had an RBI single in the second. Kathleen Berrigan had Mercy's other hit.

The Marlinas dropped to 4-6 in the Central Division at the half-way point of the season and 13-7 overall.

JOHN GLENN 10, FARMINGTON 6: Jenny Massey gave Farmington very little chance to upset host Walled Lake Central. She allowed the Falcons just two hits — a Jenny McGillich single in the first, and a Michelle Myers single in the fifth — in hurling the Rockets to a lopsided win Friday at Farmington.

Massey did not walk a batter and struck out one. Farmington pitcher Lisa Gale was just as tough through three innings, but John Glenn — 5-5 overall — pushed across two runs in the fourth, five in the fifth, two in the sixth and one in the seventh.

Katie Sylvester had three hits and knocked in a run, and Michelle Myers and Kristi Beery each had two hits for Glenn. Gale pitched all seven innings for Farmington (now 2-4) and gave up 11 hits and nine walks.

CVILLE 13, KINGSWOOD 3: Karl Walton checked Bloomfield Hills Kingswood on two hits, walking five and striking out two Friday in Livonia Clarenceville.

The Trojans had a 6-1 lead after two innings and were never threatened. Rhonda Sanders had a triple, double and sacrifice and knocked in two runs, and JoAnne Zebart and Walton added one hit and three RBIs apiece.

The game was stopped after six innings by the mercy rule.

CHURCHILL 17, HARRISON 16: This slugfest wasn't decided until the seventh inning, when Livonia Churchill — trailing by four runs — pushed across five to edge Farmington Harrison Wednesday. Marissa Grom was the winning pitcher.

May 11 for another mini-camp with the veterans, and pre-season camp begins July 26 at Oakland University.

After spending his entire career to date in Michigan, he'd like to continue here as a professional. During the mini-camp Miller stayed with his brother, Bill, and his family in Farmington Hills for the sake of a shorter commute to the Silverdome.

"I always dreamed if I could play professional football I'd like to do it in front of the people who've followed my career," he said. "I've played here my whole life."

"I can shoot over to my brothers where we've just finished dinner and are sitting around

talking. These are the things I'd miss if I had to leave."

"It makes it easier to go out there and practice and go after it," he said. "I really feel at home here."

Miller, who made two Silverdome appearances while playing in state championship games as a Harrison Hawk, would like nothing better than a long career with the Lions, but he can't afford to plan that far ahead yet.

"AT THIS POINT, I'm really trying to concentrate on the things that will make me a good football player," he said. "I signed a piece of paper and now I have to make my football club."

Coming out of a successful Harrison career in which there is no shortage of tradition, Miller went to MSU and helped the Spartans reclaim past glories. He played a major role in MSU win-

ning the Big Ten championship in 1987 and the ensuing Rose Bowl title.

Miller believes in Fionas, also a former MSU player, and thinks the Lions are on their way up, too. Thus, he'd like to stick around and be part of another rags-to-riches story.

"That was one of the reasons I went to MSU," he said. "If I had wanted a school that was always a winner I would have gone to Michigan or Penn State."

"I feel the club is on the rise just like Michigan State was when I went there. I wouldn't have come to a place where I thought they'd be a loser for 10 more years."

The Lions are definitely a team on the way up. Wayne hired a great staff and drafted outstanding players. I think he's going to do a great job, and I want to be a part of that."

Farmington takes first win

Farmington won its first boys track dual meet of the season Thursday, defeating visiting Walled Lake Central resoundingly, 97-40.

The Falcons are 1-4 overall.

Farmington's double winners were Jason Gutting and Lamont Hargde. Gutting won the shot put (45-8) and the discus (128-10), and Hargde's victories came in the 100-meter dash (11:20) and the 200 contest (22.8).

Jon Miller won the long jump for Farmington with a leap of 16-10 1/2, and Rick Cassar claimed victory in the pole vault, clearing 10 feet.

Steve Walter won the 800 meters, clocking 2:09.7, and Gene Tokraks was first in the 1,600 meters at 4:49.4.

Walter and Tokraks also teamed up with Ryan Adams and Don Sweeney in the 1,600 relay, winning the event in 8:42.7. Miller, Chris Marling, Eric Kirwin and Keith Shorter were first in the 800 relay (14:16), and Matt Langdon, Sweeney, Brian Link and Greg Endres placed first in the 3,200 relay (8:54.1).

"It's always nice to win; they've been a little scarce so far," Farmington coach Jerry Young said. "This was a good chance for our kids to get first place. We're certainly glad to see a victory."

BOB BEAUCHAMP was a triple winner Thursday for Farmington Hills Harrison, but the Hawks were dominated by Livonia Churchill in the team score, 102-25, in the Western Division dual meet.

Beauchamp excelled in the sprints, winning the 100 dash in 11.3, the 200 in 23.2 and the 400 in 54.3. The Hawks won only two other events, with Jeff Barrick taking first place in the 3,200 run in 10:16.3 and Tony Shalch winning the shot put with a throw of 47 feet, 5 1/2 inches.
