Plymouth Victor In Tourney

By FRED DeLANO Plymouth choked off a late Belleville rally Tuesday for a 75-66 triumph that gave the Rocks their second championship in three years in the Wayne Invitational Christmas Basketball Tourney and reestablished Plymouth as one of the foremost Suburban Six title contenders.

The Rocks built a big first half margin to lead by 17 on the Wayne Memorial court at intermission, and then stretched it to 21 points over the Tigers at the end of three periods before Belleville found its scoring touch. The victory completed four straight victories, compiled after losing an earlier Plymouth encounter Dec. 11, but despite brilliant scoring by Garrade Pettus could not match the Rocks' balance and rebounding strength.
