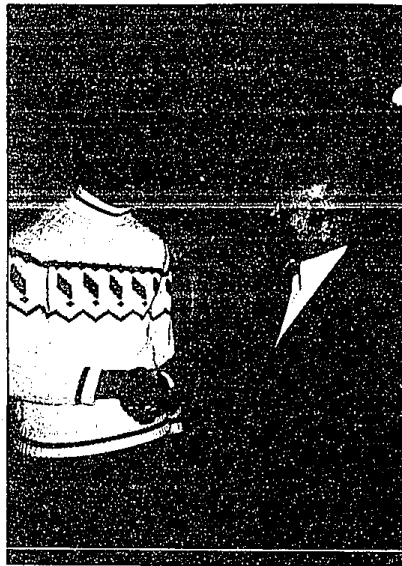

6,000 are expected for Senior Power Day

Michigan's largest annual meeting of senior citizens will be May 16, when more than 6,000 people gather in Lansing's Civic Arena for the 1989 Senior Power Day (SPD).

Chief Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley of the Michigan Supreme Court, honorary chairperson of this year's event, said she is looking forward to participating in the state's largest advocacy gathering of its kind.

"As honorary chairperson, I am pleased to promote Senior Power Day because it gives senior citizens an opportunity to see how recommendations for change are put into action," the chief justice of Michigan's highest court said.

This year's platform, dealing with issues in the areas of health, housing, transportation, education and employment, is the result of months of thought and debate by the Senior Power Day Platform Committee.

The platform that will be presented to the entire assembly on Senior Power Day has been endorsed by the 56-member Senior Power Day Board of Directors.

TICKETS to the daylong event are free and are available through the state's 14 Area Agencies on Aging. In many instances, transportation is being arranged to and from the event. A boxed lunch, to be served to the seniors by many of their legislators, will be available at a suggested donation of \$2.

Dr. Daniel Thurz, President of the National Council on the Aging,

will be the keynote speaker at the opening session. Governor James J. Blanchard and leaders from both the Michigan Senate and the Michigan House of Representatives are expected to attend portions of the gathering.

Also featured will be a Consumers Fair, where seniors can pick up free samples of products from various vendors, discount coupons and literature on a number of topics such as health care, travel opportunities and senior citizen housing.

THOSE ARRIVING early will have a chance to speak out on any issue of concern to Michigan seniors at a public hearing convening at 8:30 a.m.

Conducted by the Michigan Commission and Joint Committee on Aging, the hearing will provide a chance for seniors to bring concerns or problems to the attention of their state appointed or elected officials, or to commend programs or services that seem to function exceptionally well.

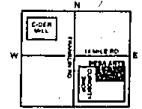
