

Mercy High track team tiptoes past Borgess

Farmington Hills Mercy's team depth and determination carried the Marlins to a rare but highly-prized victory over Redford Bishop Borgess in girls track Thursday, 68-60.

The victory enabled Mercy to stay unbeaten at 3-0 in the Central Division of the Catholic League. The Spartans are 2-2.

"We've got eight seniors on this team who had never beaten Bishop Borgess," Marlin coach Gary Servais said. "They were pumped for it."

"The depth thing had a lot to do with it, too. We had more fresh bodies to throw at them."

The outcome, however, was in doubt until Mercy won the final event, the 1,600-meter relay in which Megan Sullivan, Kathleen Gerick, Megan Lombardi and Laura Hood had a 4:18.3 time on the Redford Thurston track.

One of the most exciting individual races occurred in the 1,600 as Gerick edged out Michelle Gayney for first place. Gerick ran 5:19.9 and the Borgess runner 5:21.1.

Mercy's Carrie Wallon ran an impressive race in the open 3,200, finishing in 12:10 and beating Gayney by 31 seconds.

Hood had a personal best time of 1:05.3 to capture first place in the 400 run, and she turned around and ran her fastest split time in the 1,600 relay at 1:02.9. Hood also ran the open 800 in 2:43.8 time on the Redford Thurston track.

The Marlins won three of the four field events, and Mary Beth Strand won the 100 hurdles in 18.6. Mercy's Charese Sanders won the shot put (32-3/4), Jeannette Turner the discus (97-11) and Gail Murrie the high jump (4-8). Philana Hooper of Borgess jumped 15-2 to capture the long jump.

"We got an unexpected win in the hurdles, and Charese Sanders won the shot put despite hurting her ankle (Wednesday)," Servais said. "The Marlins added a victory in the 3,200 relay, sending Noelle Gates, Judi Rozovsky, Susan Bartlett and Darlene Dimmer on to the track to post an 11:59 time."

Hooper also won the 100 and 200 dashes in 13.6 and 27.8, respectively,

and teammate Lybany McGowan captured the 800 run with a 2:29.3 time. The Spartans' Florence Pugh won the intermediate hurdles winner at 51.1.

FARMINGTON HILLS Harrison won its second straight dual meet in the Western Division, rolling over host Walled Lake Western 69-39 Thursday.

The Hawks, 2-0 in the division and 2-1 overall, swept the relay and got double victories from Jane Peters and Nicole Leo.

Peters won the 100 hurdles in 17.7 and the 100 hurdles in 51.3, and Leo captured the 100 and 200 dashes with times of 14.1 and 29.3, respectively.

Leo and Peters also figured in the 400 dash. Heather Conley, Leo, Nivah Hakim and Carrie Henkin won the relay in 5:5.8, and Andrea Cockerham, Hakim, Henkin and Peters outran the Warriors in the 400 relay, finishing in 1:56.7.

Cockerham also scored a first place in the 400 dash with a 1:07.7 time, and Henkin had an individual victory in the long jump in which she reached a distance of 13 feet, 11 inches.

Other solo winners for the Hawks included Colleen Humman in the high jump (4-7) and Nikki Hesano in the 600 run (2:54.4).

In the 3,200 relay, Harrison's Tracy Delbosco, Sonja Magderaki, Joanna Hanawa and Hesano posted an 11:33 time, and the 1,600 relay of Peters, Marie Cholegiana, Cockerham and Hakim took first place with a 4:23.3 time.

FARMINGTON BRUSHED aside Westland John Glenn en route to its second Lakes Division victory Thursday, 102-48.

The host Falcons are 3-0 overall and won everything but the shot put in which Bianca Smiley of the Rockets claimed first place at 23-6.

Farmington's Jennifer Reed was a four-time winner, which included one relay, she captured the long jump at 11-11 1/4, won the 100 and 200 dashes in 12.3 and 27.4 and led off the 400 relay. Reed, Gail, Carrie Maier and Angie Forge won the relay in 51.5.

Julie Lawton of Farmington won the high jump at 5-1, and coach Bruce Brown was pleased to see Shelli Gail reach 5 feet for the first time this season, taking second place.

Jennifer Kiel, who usually excels in the 1,600 and 3,200 runs, ran the 800 for the first time and won that race in 3:31. The Falcons were not lacking in the other events, however, as teammate Jenny Derwinski won both, running the 1,600 in 6:07.4 and the 3,200 in 13:07.3.

Gail also won the 100 hurdles with a 16.9 showing, and teammate Susan Davidson took the 200 hurdles in 53.3. Terri Owararak threw the discus 87 feet, 7 inches for a first-place effort, and Amy Trunk's one-lap sprint ended in 1:03.5 and a victory in the 400 dash.

"See Gibson has always been a long jumper, but she said she'd like to run, too," Brown said. "She was second to Reed in the 200, which was a pleasant surprise."

Davidson had her best time in the 300 hurdles, and Derwinski winning two events was a nice surprise."

The Falcons swept the relays with the team efforts of Maier, Nicole Tooco, Trunk and Forge taking the 800 in 1:18.1. In the 1,600, it was Forge and Tooco teaming with Kiel and Kristi Bodary for a 4:24 time, and Kiel and Tooco teamed with Cheryl Caselli, Gretchen Clappion and Maureen O'Dell for a 10:48.5 clocking in the 3,200.

NORTH FARMINGTON achieved its 14th straight victory Thursday with a 69-39 triumph over host Walled Lake Central. The Raiders are 1-1 in the Lakes Division and 1-2 overall. Lisa Handrick and Jenny Weh were major players in North's success.

Weh won the 800 run in 2:39.9 and ran the lead-off leg of two winning relay teams. Weh, Jennifer Stice, Tracy Mitchell and Kari Pavelich won the 1,600 relay in 4:29, and Weh, Karen Zelenko, Lisa Handrick and Mitchell captured the 3,200 in 10:48.5.

Handrick won the long jump at 15-3, tied for first in the high jump at 4-3 and teamed with Stice, Mitchell and Jennifer Burroughs and Heather Armstrong to win the 400 relay in 1:55.2. North's Kara Hillyer won the 100 hur-

dies with an 18.6 effort, and teammate Hadley Thurman did likewise in the 300 hurdles by posting a 53.2 time.

Lisa Rivers broke the school record she set a week earlier in the 3,200 run with a 12:09.5 time, but she was second to Central's Colleen Yuhn, who had a 12:01 time. Rivers ran 12:10.3 against Livonia Stevenson on April 27. Yuhn and Rivers also finished one-two in the 1,600 with 5:26.9 and 5:33.8 times, respectively.

"We've got a couple of girls hurt," said Canton coach Don Smith, whose team improved to 7-1 with the win over North. "But good teams cover up for each other, and if we're going to be a good team, that's what we'll have to do."

Senior defender Lisa Dean tore knee ligaments against North and is lost for the season. Sophomore defender Erin Morgan was injured in the game against Livonia Stevenson, but is expected back this week.

In the win over North, Jenny Russell and Jenny Steinbebel added goals, with Smith getting an assist. Sonya Mallichaussan and Trish Greenidge also collected assists for the Chiefs.

Michelle Fortier was in goal for the shutout. North slipped to 2-6-2 with the loss.

Burgess returns to lead Harrison

Chad Burgess appeared in his first track competition for Farmington Hills Harrison since returning from a supposed season-ending knee injury Thursday.

The dual meet was a success as Burgess helped the Hawks defeat Walled Lake Western 81-55 at North Farmington and even their Western Division record at 1-1. Harrison is 4-2 overall.

Burgess, who won the 400-meter run and anchored the winning 3,200 relay team, had not competed since April 13 when he had four first places as the Hawks captured the city championship.

At that time, the three-sport senior had planned to end his high school career due to a painful condition known as fatigue knee, but he got the OK to compete again from the team doctor, according to Harrison coach John Schumacher.

"He'll still have to go through the pain and all, but he apparently can't do any long-term damage by running on it," Schumacher said. "That was the news I was hoping for, although I certainly didn't anticipate it."

"Chad is a very quiet young man but a very dynamic leader through his work habits," he added. "He'll help us tremendously with his leadership and his presence."

Harrison's Bobb Beauchamp captured the 100 dash in 11.8 and was on two of the three relays again that netted first places for the Hawks.

He anchored the 400 outfit, which included Will Matthews, Joe George and Chris Buccalos, and finished the race at 4:54.8. Burgess, Beauchamp, Dave Foss and Todd Wood won the 1,600 relay in 3:48.2.

Burgess was the winner of the open 400 at 53.6, and he combined with Jeff Barringer, Greg Sopianski and Foss to win the 3,200 relay in 9:01.5. Barringer won the 3,200 run

in 10:14. Harrison's Cabe Morphey took top honors in the high hurdles at 17.8, and Eliaz Sarcovich was first in the shot put with a throw of 45 feet.

Brian Crosso was a double winner in the 800 and 1,600 runs for Western, 9-2 in the division.

NORTH FARMINGTON also squared its division record at 1-1, blasting Walled Lake Central 99-38 in a Lakes Division contest. The Raiders are 2-3 overall.

Zaim Cummulaj was the lone double winner in individual events for the host Raiders, who won three of the relays. Cummulaj won the shot put (47-0) and the discus (139-3). Brad Ellis gave North first place in the long jump at 17 feet, 10 1/2 inches.

The Raiders dominated the open running events. Ryan Kaluzny won the 100 dash in 12.4 and Joe Schmidt the 400 run in 55.4.

Craig Stoe ran 2:11.3 in the 800, Jason Kocembo captured the 1,600 with a 4:43.5 showing and Jeff Simpson took the 3,200 to 11:14.1. The same trio also hooked up with Jim Nader to win the 3,200 relay in 9:25.4.

Schmidt also played a big role in the relay success. Schmidt, Tyson Richardson, Brad Armstrong and Jerry Dolack won the 800 in 1:59.7, and Jason Collins, Kocembo, Armstrong and Schmidt ran 3:48.4 to win the 1,600.

FARMINGTON WAS no match for Lakes Division power Westland John Glenn, which defeated the visiting Falcons 93-43 Thursday.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TRAFFIC CONTROL ORDERS

Amend the following:
Sub-section "C" to Sub-section "A"

Sub-section "D" to Sub-section "B"
