"I went from redshirt to reliever to starter," said Dorek Darkowski, capsulking his career as a Michigan State baseball player. A redshirt freshman from Plymouth Cantoo, Darkowski gambled that he could make it in the Big Ten when he enrolled at MSU and got a tryout as a walk-on.

Darkowski fit the job description.
"They wanted a leithander who could throw strikes and off-speed stuff," he said. "Someone to set up the guys who throw hard the next day."

The only NCAA Division I school that showed any interest at hil was Western Michigan.

But Darkowski liked MSU, and after his tryout in the fall of 1937 the Spartars decided to redshirt him and take another look. By the time his
