

Mrs. Fink dies

Josephine Fox Fink, sometimes known as "Mrs. Penobscot," died May 8 in Sinai Hospital of Detroit from complications resulting from a fall in her Farmington Hills home. She was 94.

Mrs. Fink earned her nickname for her longtime association with the Fred G. Nagle Co., a real estate office in the Penobscot Building in downtown Detroit. In the early '70s, she began a second career as a writer. It wasn't until 1985, at age 90, that she retired from both careers.

For six years, she wrote a weekly column in the Detroit Monitor. The columns were later compiled into a book called "Experiences Become Memories." Many of those experiences, turned-memories had to do with growing up in a lower eastside New York neighborhood, and her coming to Detroit in 1918.

She was known for her peppery tongue, her jaunty berets, and her small stature. She was among the first of the women's libbers, and commuted daily from her Farmington Hills home to the Penobscot Building by bus.

She was the widow of a Detroit tailor. The couple was married 30 years and had no children.

Mrs. Fink is survived by three nieces and seven grandnieces. At her request, funeral services were private.

Cable focuses on drugs, kids
