state that these than the registration process is relatively simple, and most applications are approved. The Department of Social Services (DSS) encourages applications and does not impose any penalities on those who may have already been operating a non-registered home and now wish to register.

First, you will be in compliance with the law. Also, you will be catlided to several tax deductions. And the DSS will place you on their listings, if you so desire, providing free advertising.

Many parents will only place their children in a registered home.

The procedure, in brief, is as follows.

Call the DSS and request an in-

erences by non-relatives, provide certification that no one in your household age 14 or older has tuber-cubes and a statement from your physician that pour are mentalty and proposed that the procedures and regulations are reviewed, questions are answered, child-care hints are given, and additional paperwork is filled out.

The DSS must then verify that you have no criminal record or record of child abuse or neglect. If all is in order, a certificate of registration will be sent to your home in four to six weeks.

But, within three months, you will have a home check by the DSS.

At this time, they will inspect numerous things such as safety conditions, adequate space and sleeping facilities, toys and equipment. DSS will leave a list of things to be corrected within a specified period of time. quiry packet.
