POSITION STATEMENT

Helen Ditzhay, candidate for re-election to the Farmington school board, announced in a June 6 press release that she supports having the central administration meet regularly with the presidents of each of the

district's bargaining units.

She said she also supports the fiscal responsibility the district has exhibited during her four years in office.

Outcome-based education should be examined, she said. "There is always room for improvement, even in a very good school system. With individual student plans, even the small percentage of Farmington's students who do not master 75 percent of the MEAP objectives would be in focus for special help.

"The district's ACT scores are above both the state and national averages. This is the best most used by Michigan colleges and universities, when student entry is considered."

Ditzhay calls for increased citizen participation, advice and involvement in decisions relating to redistricting, maintenance and renovation needs.

She thinks "it's time to reaffirm the diversity of the student body and populace by promoting the strengths that our many differences provide

the community."

"They have actively worked for excellence and they have been prudent voters and taxpayers in this community for many years," Jensen said.

penalties," Dwyer said. "They (license holders) really have nothing to lose except a couple hundred dollars.

If the LCC got tough, there could be a deterrent for these licensees to abide by the regulations." But LCC executive services director Dan Sparks said there are many

factors that determine the type of penalty — fine or license suspension or revocation — that results from a violation of the state liquor laws.

"It's not a driver's license with points. But the penalties the commission has assessed have gotten a lot more tougher in the past couple years," Sparks said. The maximum fine for selling to a minor or intoxicated person is \$1,000.

COMMISSIONERS ARE required to have a special hearing for licensees who chalk up at least three violations in 24 months. Commissioners are required to suspend or revoke

the license. The number of days licenses have been suspended has varied, depending on each individual case.

"We have revoked a fair amount of licenses because of this. But it's hard to tell if it's a deterrent," Sparks said.

In January, city officials mailed letters to MLCC chairwoman Patricia Knox urging maximum penalties for liquor law violators. "We call on you to support our effort and revoke licenses from chronic violators to the maximum extent permitted by law," according to the letter.

What makes the results of the lat-

est operation all the more disappointing, Dwyer said, is that licensees were forewarned, through an Observer story, of the impending undercover sweep.

"To me, it just tells me these people will continue to sell to minors. But we are pleased with the other locations — the majority of locations that were not cited — who have learned maybe from a bad experience or who have trained and worked with their employees," Dwyer said.

Police cited licensees for violating LCC regulations barring sale of alcohol to minors and employees for violating city ordinance.

Licensees either sign a waiver for the LCC or face a hearing before the commission, which levies fines or penalties. Penalties levied by the LCC vary depending on each individual case and past record. "The determination of guilt or innocence has nothing to do with the past record," Sparks said.


