2 Lawmakers Set Joint Ceremonies

With appropriate ceremonies to which the general public, his neighbors and friends will be welcome, State Sen. elect Carl D. Pursell (R-Plymouth) will take his oath of office at 5:15 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 7 in the Mayflower Meeting House, Plymouth.

The swearing-in officially will mark his transition from Wayne County commissioner to that of a member of the upper house of the state Legislature.

While the ceremony is not precedent setting, it will be unusual and made more so by the fact that State Rep. James Tierney, Garden City, Democrat of the 35th District, who has been elected to his third term, will take his oath at the same time.

"BY TAKING the oath of office in my home town," Pursell said, "it will save a trip to Lansing for a number of friends, and it also will make it possible for many members of the high school civics class to attend."

"We are allowed only five passes for the Senate gallery when the entire Senate is sworn in, and this number could not accommodate the students."

Two circuit judges—George Bowles and Tom Foley—will officiate. Judge Bowles will administer the oath to his neighbor, Pursell, and Judge Foley will do the same for Rep. Tierney.

THE CEREMONIES will open with the presentation of the colors by the American Legion and the VFW and will be followed by the invocation by Rev. Paul Thompson. A musical interlude will be offered after which the oaths will be administered to the two state officers.

The one-hour festivities which are scheduled to begin at 5:30 p.m. will mark the first time in regency that any state official ever has taken his oath of office in Plymouth.

Light refreshments will be served.

Evans Estimates Earnings

Evans Products Co.'s 1970 earnings were estimated from \$1.80 to \$1.95 per common share. Mopord A. Orloff, chairman, announced.

The company has a plant at 13101 Eckles Rd., Plymouth.

While fourth-quarter earnings were adversely affected by continuing low levels of lumber, plywood and particleboard prices, as well as a 12-week strike at Belle City Malleable Iron Co., Racine, Wis., these factors were partially offset by a better than expected fourth-quarter performance of the Retail and Homes Groups.

In looking ahead to 1971, Orloff noted that Evans was projecting 1,700,000 conventional housing starts industry-wide for the year. This forecast was given further support by strong November advance sales in the homes group which were running 50 per cent ahead of November 1969.

5-Year Job

Area Politicos Stick With ADA

Mrs. Ethel Schwartz of 17391 Bonstelle, Southfield, is the new corresponding secretary for the Metropolitan Detroit Americans for Democratic Action (ADA), a liberal political group.

Mrs. Schwartz was elected in December along with new ADA Chairman Roger E. Craig, former state senator from Dearborn. Craig succeeds Mrs. Annette Miller of Huntington Woods, who was elected to the State Board of Education.

The elections almost coincided with official creation of a liberal Human Rights Party in Michigan Dec. 8 with Zolton Perency as titular leader.

Mrs. Schwartz told Observer Newspapers that the ADA hasn't taken any stand concerning the new party yet.

Craig's acceptance statement hinted that some official position will become a necessity.

"IN THE COMING year, the ADA will redouble its efforts as a force for human progress," he said. "We have fought and will continue to fight the forces of repression, division and ignorance."

"With a national administration that promised to 'bring us together' pushing us further apart every day, the need for an independent, liberal group like the ADA has

never been greater," he said.

"We aim to fill that need," Craig and Mrs. Schwartz, who formerly lived in Redford Township, are among eight principal ADA officers and nine executive board members elected for 1971.

NEW VICE chairmen are Richard McGhee, Sol Plafkin, Jesse Goodwin and John Martin, all of Detroit.

Elected treasurer was Rita Raymer, 26389 York, Huntington Woods. Recording secretary is Kay Schloff of 12758 Argyle, Southgate.

Executive board members will be: Ann Cook, Maggie Tyson, Sara Williams, Douglas Williams, Bernie Fieger, Zeline Richards, Dorothy Schankler, Lynn Parsons and Dr. Paul Lowinger, of Detroit and northern suburbs.

Elected delegates to the national ADA board were McGhee, Kay Schloff and Annette Miller. U. S. Rep. John Conyers Jr., (D-Detroit) is a former delegate.

Americans for Democratic Action, self-described as an "independent, liberal, political organization," has its metropolitan Detroit headquarters at 25456 Warehouse Drive, Huntington Woods.

ALLEN SIPHER of Farmington was a 1970 executive board member. National ADA chairman in 1970 was economist and author John Kenneth Galbraith.

Among 1970 national offi-

cers were the late Walter P. Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers union; Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr., advisor to presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson; and Alard Lowenstein, New York congressman who led the anti-war Democrats in drafting of U.S. Sen. Eugene McCarthy as a presidential candidate.

Slate Rep. Jackie Vaughn III (D-Detroit) served as a vice president of the Metropolitan Detroit chapter last year.

Craig, who gained wide publicity for his backing of migrant workers and a near-run for Michigan governor, was a 1970 executive board member.
