

Arts Council Will Co-Sponsor 'Exposure To The Arts' Series

FARMINGTON, Conn. — The Farmington Arts Council, in conjunction with the adult education program of the Farmington Schools, is sponsoring a course entitled "Exposure to the Arts." It will consist of eight Tuesday evenings, each devoted to a different medium. The purpose of the course is to acquaint people with all phases of the arts in thorough lectures, demonstrations, films and slides.

The course will begin Jan. 12 with Jan Artzen who will discuss painting. Miss Artzen is a Belgian

born artist who attended the Connecticut State Art School in New York and has done graduate work in Florence, Italy.

She came to Michigan as director of community education for Cranbrook Academy of Art and has worked with the community services department of Oakland University where she is currently teaching an extension course in the humanities.

Following Miss Artzen, on Jan. 19, will be Hal Whiting, a residential and commercial artist of this area. Whiting graduated from the Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh with a bachelors

and masters degree in architecture.

WALLY SMITH will head the drama section Jan. 26. Smith brings to his discussion a varied background which leans heavily toward the field of dramatics. He holds bachelors and masters degrees in speech from Wayne State University and won the bronze, silver and gold speech awards while there.

On Feb. 2, Miss Evelyn Kreson, director of the Suburban Concert Ballet, will

discuss dance. Miss Kreson has studied ballet with a number of fine professionals in the Detroit area.

Mrs. Iris Jones, a contributing editor to the *Sunday Magazine* section of the *Detroit News*, will treat her listeners to "A Look at Creative Writing." Mrs. Jones has traveled extensively, has been a freelance writer for a number of years, is president of the Detroit Women Writers, and is on the Literature Committee of the State Council of Arts.

SCULPTURE will be the

subject of Ted Striewski's talk Feb. 16.

Striewski, presently on the staff of Oakland Community College, studied at Wayne State University receiving a bachelors, masters in education and a master of fine arts degree. He has received several first place awards in various exhibits and has had one man shows in Detroit and California.

On Feb. 23, Ted Mann will be talking on music. Mann received his bachelors at the Eastman School of Music in

Rochester, New York and his masters at San Francisco State College. He was awarded the George Eastman scholarship and has had extensive experience both in performing and composing.

The series will close March 2 with Joseph Vaughn, chief editor of WXYZ, speaking on the arts in the communications fields. Vaughn has been in broadcasting in one capacity or another since 1951 and has received broad recognition for public service in the field of health. He is also active in an advisory capacity in the Boy Scouts and Little League.
