

Center Offers Even Larger Class Variety

FARMINGTON

Echoes of the carol singing faded, the Farmington Community Center briskly gets ready for new winter classes beginning Jan. 18. "Registrations will be accepted Jan. 7-8 between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m."

New offerings begin with Art Appreciation for Adults which will investigate modern painting from Impressionism to Surrealism. It will be taught by Elizabeth Allen Defouloy on Wednesdays in the morning beginning Feb. 3.

Banjo for beginners will be taught by Tim Hoy on Monday evenings beginning Jan. 25.

A VENTURE into extra-sensory perception will be

conducted by Elizabeth Sappere on Monday evenings beginning Jan. 25. Mrs. Sappere describes her class as a "skeptical but sympathetic look at extra-sensory perception and related phenomena." Jewelry making will be available Wednesday evenings beginning Jan. 27. Students will learn gravity and centrifugal casting and produce rings, bracelets, cuff links or belts under the direction of Miss Joy Allan. They may also work with pewter.

Russell Barnes will bring his kaleidoscopic background in politics and government to the center with a course on international relations Thursday evenings beginning Jan. 28. The study is approached by way of current events and will add much depth to the


student's understanding of contemporary society.

New Horizons in Needlepoint is Jane S. Hill's way of presenting a fresh approach to creative designs on canvas. Her class will be held Wednesday afternoons beginning Jan. 27.

Martha Cormie will introduce her water color course on Thursday evenings beginning Jan. 28. She and her pupils will explore many combinations of wash, dry brush, and pen and ink techniques.

Thursday, and Friday afternoons. Mrs. Harriet Vickery will hold classes on Wednesday afternoons.

Bead flower making will be repeated on Thursday afternoons. Mrs. Marianne Wood instructing. Her classes produce decorative arrangements otherwise found only in fashionable boutiques at expensive imports.

Bridge classes will be held Monday evenings and Tuesday afternoons for beginners. Tuesday afternoons for more advanced players. Mrs. Betty Schwehr will instruct the daytime beginners. Mrs. Ruth Dillon evening beginners, and Mrs. Kay Clinton, advanced.

Creative stitchery fans may learn as many as 40 traditional crewel stitches in Gwen Fogarty's Thursday

morning and afternoon classes. They create wall hangings, pictures, pillows and decorate clothing.

Mrs. Albert Francis holds classes in crewel embroidery Wednesday mornings and afternoons as well as Thursday afternoons. She teaches methods used at the Wallingford Crewel Studio in Pennsylvania.

Decoupage with F. Dale Bottorf instructing will be taught on Wednesday mornings and afternoons beginning Jan. 27. Even beginners will immediately learn to fashion boxes, plaques, purses bookends and many other items of heirloom quality.

DRAMATICS will concentrate on play production with Mrs. Ceci Orman leading the class on Thursday afternoons beginning Jan. 21. Weekly rehearsals will culminate in presentation of a play early in April.

Mrs. Orman also has a popular Story Time for Tots on Thursday afternoons beginning Jan. 21, a fun-time, for pre-schoolers.

French and Spanish classes will be held on Saturday mornings in a program originally begun by Ten Mile PTA. For beginners and practiced linguists, the classes include students from grades two through seven and art taught by Mrs. Patricia Stebbins and Jim Gross. Spanish classes for adults with Jim Gross as their instructor will be started Wednesday evenings beginning Jan. 27.

Gardening and Landscape Design will again be taught by Observer columnist Betty Frankel on Monday afternoons beginning Feb. 22. The course allows time for discussion of specific gardening problems.

Guitar lessons will be available once more for beginners with Judy Orans on Saturday mornings beginning Feb. 6 and for more advanced pupils with Tim Hoy on Monday afternoons beginning Jan. 25.

Knitters may report to Florence Smith Monday afternoons beginning Jan. 25. Her class is a continuation of the one begun last fall.

OIL PAINTERS will meet with Marvin Boerbohm on Tuesday mornings or evenings beginning Jan. 19. His class will include adults and high school juniors or seniors.

Mrs. Irene MacKinnon's sewing classes are scheduled for mornings and afternoons on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays plus one on Friday mornings. Beginners, intermediate and advanced sewing are taught at separate sessions.

"Slymastics," a specialty of Ricky Dove, will be taught Thursday afternoons beginning Jan. 28. The course provides a fun way to get

into shape with basic exercise, music and dancing.

Teen modeling may be learned on Monday afternoons beginning Jan. 25, from professional model Barbara McIntosh. Her course stresses development of self-confidence and poise, posture, walking, stage presence, tasteful use of cosmetics, hair styling and fashion.

Woodcarving was introduced last summer by Mrs. Loretta Hawkins and will be continued Monday mornings for beginners and afternoons for advanced students beginning Jan. 25. Beginners will learn to carve simple birds and animals; advanced pupils will develop their skills.
