Spruce-up campaign short of financial goal

The Gazebo-Pergola Fund Committee is \$6,000 from its goal of raising \$40,000 to build a gazebo and seating area on the north side of Grand River, between the Village Commons shopping center and Farmington Place Apartments.

Thirty-five individuals, business and community organizations have contributed amounts of at least \$500 and will be permanently acknowledged on the site. Another 25 donors have also made contributions. Sierra Pines Construction Co. of Farmington has been awarded the contract to build the structure, which includes a 20-foot gazebo flanked by two pergolas (seating areas). Both pergolas will contain benches selected to complement the structure and surrounding area.

Four pedestrian lights, to match those on Grand River, will be installed in the concrete plaza area on the site. A matching drinking fountain will also be installed.

Incumbents ousted in C'ville, Walled Lake

Challengers ousted incumbents Monday in two school board races that affect residents in Farmington Hills.

In the Walled Lake Consolidated School District, voters ousted incumbent Patricia Jackman of West Bloomfield after two terms in office and returned former school board trustee Cynthia Campion of Walled Lake to office.

Campion was defeated in 1987 after completing her first four-year term. In this election, she won a four-year term beginning July 1 by

getting 380 votes to Jackman's 235. Residents in the northwestern-most square mile of Farmington Hills attend the Walled Lake schools.

Only 620 Walled Lake district voters, or 1.2 percent, participated out of nearly 50,000 potential voters. Unopposed, G. William Knight of West Bloomfield received 529 votes to fill the expired one-year term created when board president Sally Vaughn moved from the 9,000-student district.

"I think we need to plan ahead for educating everyone's children, not

just the exceptional," Campion said Tuesday, describing her goals. "We need to work harder at keeping in school the ones that are dropping through the cracks. . . . We have a fine school system. That's why I'm there with my children."

TO THE southeast in neighboring Clarenceville Public Schools, 10-year-old school board candidate Dale Weighill defeated Gary Gasser, appointed to the board last June. Weighill got 183 votes to 157 for Gasser to win election to a two-year term starting July 1. Both are Livonia residents. About 5 percent, or roughly 235, of the 4,900 registered voters turned out.

The 2,273-student Clarenceville district encompasses a portion of southeast Farmington Hills.

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negotiating equitable contracts with school staff, most of whom will be without a contract as of June 30, and possible problems with redistricting of the new school.

Both incumbents also said they viewed the district's new west-side elementary, slated to open in the fall of 1990, as a neighborhood school.

IN MONDAY'S election, Ditzhazy got 1,075 votes, Cotton 939 votes, Ranney 475 votes and Akouri 429 votes. Ditzhazy won in all precincts, including the absentee category.

Voters in Precinct 2 at Dunckel Middle School cast the most votes with 906, followed by Precinct 1 at Farmington Training Center with

854. At Precinct 3, Warner Middle School, 517 votes were cast. At Precinct 4, East Middle School, 464 votes were cast. A total of 178 votes were cast absentee.

Of those voting, 1,481 cast their ballots in person, while 93 voted absentee.
