Criminal charges are pending as

the explosion of lireworks from a
second-floor window at the Clarion

"We interviewed three Farming-ton Hills juveniles — ages 14, 15 and 16 — and turned them over to their parents," Sgt. Charles Nebus said. "Investigation is pending. Criminal charges may be sought against one of them."
