# Hair stylist scores in world of pro golf

It couldn't get any better for aspiring pro-golfer Agim Bardha of Birmingham.

One morning in Scotland last year, when he played in the senior men's division of the British Open in Scotland, his partner was golf great Billy Casper.

Then, that afternoon Bardha played a threesome with golf legends Arnold Palmer and Gary Player.

This year has been a little slow, however, for Bardha, 52, owner and chief stylist at his own salon. He's played just four matches in the PGA Senior Men's tour (for men over 50) and made \$10,000 this year, compared to \$44,000 (officially) last year, which was enough to cover \$30,000 worth of expenses and buy a few new golf balls.

STILL, HE'S NOT complaining. Bardha considers himself to be very fortunate to be in America, doing the two things he loves most — running his own salon and playing golf.

He says he could have been "tending sheep" in his native Albania instead.

Bardha, his mother, and two older brothers escaped their country's oppressive post-World War II regime in 1953. One brother who didn't make it died in an Albanian prison in 1947.

The family eventually moved to Wayne, Mich., in 1958. It was while he was working in a factory there that he decided that hairdressing was the profession for him, because, he said, "I love women."

His brother Eric was going to beauty school at the time.

"I saw all these beautiful, white-skirted women going in and out," he said, and that was that.

His success at the school, and branching out to his own shop was "freaky," Bardha said.

"WE EUROPEANS give it 150 percent for any profession," he said. "I picked it up right away, and the (school) owner put me in one of his shops while I was still in school."

But Bardha was ambitious. "I wanted to work for one of the best — so I went to Nino (Genna, of Antonio's in Birmingham) and asked him for a job," he said.

Genna introduced him to golf, and Bardha found it "very addicting."

He was good enough to catch the eye of former pro Chuck Kocis at Red Run Golf Course in Royal Oak. "A lot of people told me to try out," Bardha said. But when Kocis said it and told him "you're about as good as any I've seen," he did it.

To qualify for the PGA Senior Tour, which plays about 42 tournaments each year or about three a month, Bardha said he had to finish in the top eight players, or earn more than \$54,000 last year.

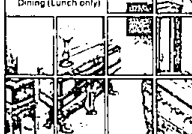

### CHANGING ARTHRITIS MEDICATIONS

If a medicine for arthritis isn't working, why not drop it and try another?

That advice seems sensible, but your doctor may be reluctant to follow such a course. The reasons are two-fold.

First, arthritis medicines have side effects. You incur a risk with each change you make. Such untoward reactions include stomach ulcers, damage to liver cells, and possible loss of the kidney's ability to function. There is no guarantee that having used one anti-inflammatory medication with no ill effects, that you can start another with impunity. In addition, if you have other medical problems, you run the risk of possible interaction between your new arthritis medication and your other drugs.

Second, your conclusion that the present medication is ineffective may be incorrect. Cases abound where an individual stops a medicine because of its supposed lack of effect, only to develop pain far beyond what was imagined possible.

Arthritis can flare so that no change in medication suffices. Rather than starting a new regimen with its risks of failure and side effects, such times most often call for heat, rest, joint injections and reliance on current medication.
