

Nov. 7 library vote set

"Each city is going to have to review their annual operating budget," finance director Charles Roach said.

Farmington Hills allocates what amounts to three-quarters of a mill to the library. If the proposals pass, that amount would not be allocated to the library. But there's no guarantee in the future, that amount might not be used for other purposes, such as drain improvements, Roach said.

Library budgets for 1990-91 and 1991-92 are not expected to substantially increase over the 1989-90 \$2.2 million budget. In 1992-93, the first full year of operations in the new expanded library, the budget

is expected to increase significantly.

THE BOND proposition asks to borrow a maximum \$14.5 million in one or more series for building, furnishing, equipping and developing a site for a new 60,000-square-foot library to replace the cramped 30,000-square-foot facility at 32737 13 Mile. The bond proposal also includes making necessary repairs and improvements at the Farmington branch, 33550 Liberty.

Telling council members that \$14.5 million is a high estimate, Papal added, "hopefully, that can be lowered before bonds can be issued."

Estimated building costs are ex-

pected to be refined within the next two months. But the maximum \$14.5 million bond proposal is based on land costs of \$1.7 million, \$8 million, construction; \$1.8 million, contingency and inflation; \$1.8 million, furniture, fixtures, and interior design; fees \$407,000, bonds, legal fees; and \$185,360, Farmington branch improvements.

The \$14.5 million bond proposal is based on the notion that the two cities would assume ownership of the 13 Mile library. If the library is sold, however, the bond total could be reduced by a minimum \$2 million, Papal said. The council is expected to study possible uses of the existing main library.

police/fire calls

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week:

● FELONY CHARGES

A 19-year-old Detroit man faces felony charges after a knife and a billy club were found in his possession during a traffic stop at Northwestern Highway and 13 Mile in Farmington Hills (June 27, police said).

Arraigned Thursday before District Judge Fred Harris of Farmington, John David McCoy pleaded not guilty to charges of carrying a concealed weapon and possessing a dangerous weapon, both five-year felonies.

Harris set a cash or surety bond of \$2,500 pending a preliminary exam in 4th District Court.

A knife, with a four-inch blade, was found in a felt bag on the car's front floor. A billy club was found next to the driver, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

One from Farmington Hills and one from Garden City — face charges of breaking and entering of an occupied dwelling with intent to commit larceny and larceny under \$100 in Oakland County Probate Court, Juvenile Division, Fox said.

● UNARMED ROBBERY

A 16-year-old Farmington Hills youth was robbed and cut on the mouth in a traffic altercation at Drake and Freedom June 14, police said.

According to the teenager's account to Farmington Hills officer Duane Fox, he was assaulted while stopped at the intersection at 12:30 a.m.

One man reached in the open driver's window and punched him in the mouth. Another opened the passenger door and took \$40 from his pants pocket.

The victim was treated at Providence Hospital facilities in both Novi and Southfield.

● VAN DAMAGE

Damage was estimated at \$1,500 when the windshield was cracked and a brick was thrown through a side window in a van parked at the Metrobank Building, 37000 Grand River, June 28-29.

A smoke bomb was tossed through the broken window onto a leather captain's chair but did not burn it, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

● THEFTS REPORTED

A 1985 Ford valued at \$3,200 was reported stolen from along Westmoreland, Farmington Hills, June 2-28. It was recovered in Detroit, with the radio missing.

Exam waived in Hills porn case

Soroki's attorney, Jack Bain of Birmingham, complained to Schaeffer about the police department's \$200 fees for copying the 308 pages in the magazines sold to the undercover tailor.

"This is absolutely disgusting," Bain said. "I'm sure I don't have to tell the court that if we'd gone to a professional copier, we would have paid 4-5 cents a page."

Oakland County assistant prosecutor Jean Gibson told Schaeffer that \$1 a page is the department's fee for copying. "I don't think the court should rule this case is any different" and expect a lower copying fee.

But Bain said he thought he would be able to make copies of the magazines in his office, but the finished copies were delivered at his office. He received a bill for copying Thursday before the scheduled preliminary exam.

"FOR OPENERS, I'm not sure this is something the court should be involved with," Schaeffer said.

She finally suggested that Bain work out the disagreement with police officials.

When Dwyer publicized the department's undercover operations June 19, he also announced that he expects to seek more warrants

against store owners for selling obscene materials. Undercover pornography operations, similar to the city's undercover liquor operations, will be continued to help control the sale of obscene materials, particularly to minors, Dwyer said.

Grand Square Liquor Shoppe was the only store in which the 15-year-old was asked to try to buy pornographic materials. But it was the only store from which an undercover officer bought magazines.

Of the 35 establishments visited by Farmington Hills police, 15 do not sell material that falls under the law, police said. The remaining establishments sell adult entertainment magazines, such as Hustler.

Playboy and Penthouse. Five of the establishments sell hard-core materials, the type bought by the 15-year-old, Dwyer said.

"There will be other people prosecuted in the city if they continue to sell and distribute obscene materials to people. We're putting them on notice that the department is going to be investigating and seeking warrants," Dwyer said.

The 18-member Farmington Hills Police Department's Citizens Crime Advisory Committee prompted the police undercover investigation into party stores and bookstores to determine whether pornographic materials are being sold to minors.

Arthritis today
Pain in the knee does not necessarily mean that you need an x-ray of the joint.

X-RAYS OF THE KNEES
An x-ray is indicated when initial treatment fails to provide substantial improvement to your knee. Then the question arises if the diagnosis is correct; two conditions exist, and initial treatment addressed only one of them. An x-ray often can answer such questions.

X-ray is in order if a previously well-controlled knee problem suddenly changes for the worse. You may have a dull pain in your knee that persists treated adequately. Based on intense pain that doesn't let up, X-ray is an excellent way of revealing changes in the joint such as calcifications or a cyst, not evident by examination.

X-ray is useful at your initial visit when the doctor, after examination, is uncertain about the diagnosis. He may want to see that your knee osteoarthritis, but only an x-ray can reveal its extent. Or, on the evidence available, the question remains if you have osteo- or rheumatoid arthritis. X-ray will provide the information needed to make the distinction and insure that you begin appropriate treatment.

The same indications for x-rays hold for the hands, shoulders, hips and feet.
