ALDRIDGE has reached beyond the bounds of Indianwood in Itali scarch of this golfing empire. An automotive manufacturer before steering headlong into his burgeoning love affair with golf, Aldridge recently expanded Indianwood by brilling a second 18-bole golf course, which opened last year. He is currently constructing three other courses — in Atlanta, Baltimore and Parmington Hills (12 Mile and Haggerty). Another course looms as a possibility in the Lake Orion area. And that's not to mention an overseas project in progress in Belling. "Golf is opening up all over the United States. . all over the world, he said. "It's project after project. 
