"I really questioned whether we could save him at first," Anderson said. "But then I felt he was pretty secure."

Irvin Knapp, a longtime Farmington Township farmer who a rel-ative called "atways, optimistic, strong willed and open-minded to today's changing lifestyles," die June 25 from injuries sustained in a traffic accident. A resident of Detroit Baptist Manor in Farmington Hills, he was 90.

Man seeks privacy in death vigil

Dick Weber, legal counsel for the Michigan State Medical Society, said he was surprised Gage passed up an opportunity to set a precedent in the case. "We don't have any definitive law in Michigan, legislatively or jud-ticially, upon which anyone can rely," Weber said.

Rivlin became a quadriplegic 18

years ago when his spinal cord was severed in a surfing accident in fluutington Beach, Calif. The former Oak Park resident returned to Detroit after his injury because he believed he could get better medical treatment here.

Paralyzed from the neck down, Rivlin said his condition worsened in 1986 when he had an ancuryam and a

resulting operation on his spinal cord. He was then forced to be con-nected to the ventilator to help him breathe.

Rivlin is the third right-to-die request in Oakland County in the last two years.


