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ary incident in Novi where an em-ployee of a Service Merchandise store was arrested in the theft of more than \$7,000 in jeweiry from the retailer, West Bloomfield police Sgt. Mike Messina said. The employ-ee, a 20-year-old New Hudson wom-an, toid police-sha delivered the jeweiry to Fracchia and Eason at Dee Frocks, the former Haggerty Harry's at Mapic and Haggerty.

THE NOVI POLICE Department contacted West Bloomfield police personnel, who obtained a search warrant and wired the woman for sound. They recorded conversations that implicated Fracehia and Eason,
