Sorenson had special praise for the floats in the parade. "It's obvious that there was a lot of effort and time spent in creating each one—we really appreciate the effort that was put forth."

In conversations with crafters, they indicated they did well financially at festival, Sorenson said. Officials have already begun planning for the 1990 festival. The Founders Festival was start-

ed to tie together a number of community activities, including sidewalk sales, the Elks Ox Roast, and other events hosted by service clubs like the Jaycees. The theme was selected that year, to honor the founders of the Farmington community.
