
Song Sisters

If you are an adult who is severely hearing impaired, receiving a very limited amount of benefit from your hearing alds and are unable to understand speech over the phone, you may be eligible to enroll in an FDA approved clinical study for cochlear implants. Cochlear implants may limprove communication abilities for people who are severely hearing impaired from nerve deafnests.

Dr. T. Manford McGee, Dr. Jack M. Kartush and Dr. Malcolm D. Graham of the Michigan Ear Institute are screening candidates for this clinical study.

Here are the candidate criteria:

• 18 years and older.

• Receive very limited speech understanding through hearing alds.

• Severe to profound bilateral sensorineural hearing loss.

• Became severely deaf after age 12.

Drug showing promise for leukemia patients

First phase results of a genetically engineered drug which helps restore the production of white blood cells is shoring promise for leukemia patients according to reseachers at the University of Texas Anderson Cancer Center.



The drug, Granulocyte-Macrophage Colony Stimulating Factor (GM-CFS), is a gentically engineered version of a naturally occuring hormone, or growth factor, that stimulates the bose marrow to produce large quantities of while blood cells. Dramatic increases in the number of neutrophils (white blood cells crucial to infection centrol), were reported in five newly diagnosed patients with acute mylogenous leukemia (AMI), who received chemotherapy followed two days by infusions of GM-CFS. Although testing of GM-CFS is in its infancy, the Texas researcher are recoveraged with the preliminary results and feel that GM-CFS may play a significant role for AML patients.


